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



If you don't know where you're going...



On a map, the profile of southeastern North Carolina looks much like other mid-Atlantic coastal realms, but from the ground, or rather by kayak, this part of the world reveals itself to be a rich and wondrous place with a diversity of plants and animals unmatched anywhere on the Atlantic seaboard, north of Florida. And nestled amid this glorious part of the coast sits a barrier island, a wedge of land, populated by

maritime forest on the high ground, and grassy tidal salt marsh and sandy beaches where land meets sea around the island's fringes.

Bald Head Island is a restless bit of sand formed at the southeastern lip of the Cape Fear River, a turbid stream flowing into the Atlantic Ocean at the rate of some 9,000 cubic feet of water per second. Poised at the eastern corner of the river's mouth is Bald Head Island, a weathered, time-tested berg whose dense maritime woods

provide nesting habitat for warblers and buntings, and safe haven to countless other small birds during their spring and autumn migrations. This welcoming sentinel of an island has also long been cherished by seafaring travelers, who historically made way in its direction with the aid of Old Baldy, one of our nation's oldest lighthouses.

Today, Old Baldy remains an icon of North Carolina's coast and a prominent feature of the island, visible from the marina where pleasure crafts and passenger ferries now reside. Not far from the marina is a small shop that rents one of my favorite modes of aquatic transportation: the kayak. It was there on a June morning that I met Rob, a young man familiar with the waters around Bald Head Island as evidenced by his suggestion of a creek he thought I might like to explore. He called it "No-Name Creek," because charts and maps offer only a cursory indication of its presence in the form of an untitled narrow blue line meandering through an otherwise grassy marsh.


Rob outfitted me with a comfortable blue-green kayak and delivered me to a small boat ramp located on Bald Head Creek, the southernmost tidal creek on the Cape Fear River's eastern side. Bald Head Creek is a significant channel at high tide, with a depth of several feet and in places a width spanning over 50 yards. Entering Bald Head Creek during a flowing tide, I was assured of having plenty of water to get me well up into the reaches of No-Name Creek.

The confluence of No-Name Creek and Bald Head Creek is less than a 10-minute paddle from the ramp, if one does not get distracted along the way. But as luck would have it, I did have cause for making a course correction to sidle up to a partially submerged tree that a past storm relocated in the channel. What caught my attention was another icon of the coast: a great egret. The crisp-white bird with long, spindly legs stood inches above the water on one of the tree's outstretched limbs. I watched it crane its head forward with outstretched neck and, deftly as possible, the predator suddenly thrust its long, pointed tweezers-like bill into the water, withdrawing a small glinting fish I could not identify before the egret bolted it down. This, I thought, was a good omen, and leaving the contented bird to its banquet, I set off in pursuit of No-Name Creek, aided by a rising tide.

After a short paddle Bald Head Creek, I could see a smaller tributary visible on the left bank. From

From the vantage of a kayak, the salt marsh closes in around you as the creek channel narrows, aided in part by a profuse strand of slender-leaved plants called salt marsh cord grass. Cord grass is a tough, fibrous salt marsh plant that thrives in a zone from the creek edge to just above the high tide line. As I paddled near the grass, I could see little glints of light reflecting from the plants' leaves and stems. The glinting was caused by salt crystals that the cord grass "sweats out" of its tissues to prevent dehydration in this otherwise inhospitable place for most plants.

The thought of salt in my tissues reminded me to take a drink of fresh water. As I reached for my water bottle at the front of the kayak, I must have made a noise because there suddenly erupted a

flurry of wings as a white ibis lifted from amid the grass less than 10 feet from my kayak. The ibis' feet were black with mud, as were many of its feathers, the result, I assume, of its efforts at stalking fiddler crabs that I could see ambling about the creek bank in advance of the rising water.

Fiddler crabs are small crustaceans so-named because the inchlong male possesses a formidable looking claw as large as its body. The male crabs wave their oversized claw to intimidate other males and alternately to attract female crabs. All about the creek bank I could see finger-width holes in the mud; these are the burrows these marsh engineers excavate in which to hide from fishy predators during high tides. During low tides these ever-alert crabs prowl the marsh's exposed flats gathering fistfuls of mud and sand into their mouths from which they rinse algae, diatoms and bacteria, leaving BB-size pellets of clean sand in their path.

Leaving the crabs, and, as I rounded a bend in the creek, one of my paddle strokes surprised a large fish that had been lurking in the lee side of the bend. The animal swept right under my boat and in the shallow water I could see a tell-tale spot near its tail's base. It was a red drum, about 18 inches long, and I imagine it had been waiting for some hapless shrimp or small fish to sweep past its ambush site.

Flushed with that discovery, I set out to investigate a narrow tributary that I hoped might carry me close to a raised hummock forested with live oaks and cabbage palms. These lesser marsh channels typically dead-end not far from the creek they drain into, but with the tide high, this particular one carried me right up to the shoreline and into the shade offered by the large oaks. Sitting quietly at the foot of the hummock some few hundred feet from No-Name Creek, I looked east across the expanse of marsh toward the ocean which I could not see but knew was not far distant. It was at that moment that I really felt immersed in the unique realm of the Bald Head Island marshes.

Just as I was reveling in the moment, a piercing cry erupted off to my left. I turned and looked up to see a lone red-tailed hawk alighting in a tall, storm-wracked pine tree. It let forth another cry that was quickly returned by a second hawk perched in a pine to my right. The birds then took flight to exchange places after several rounds of screeching cries. In their new positions, they each cried out once more before the bird to my left flew back to join the bird I could no longer see, but could hear calling from within the hummock's forest.

As the hawk's raucous antics quieted, my ears caught the babbling chatter of songbirds coming from the profuse tangle of oaks, palms, wax myrtle and yaupon growing along the edge of marsh and hummock. The calls included a chorus of whistles and chirrups of at least two male cardinals, along with the unmelodic "wheeep" from some great-crested flycatchers. And then I heard a song from a small bird that I knew bested the cardinals and flycatchers both in lyrics and colorful beauty: the painted bunting. Aptly named, the sparrow-sized male painted bunting sports a palette of colors including a blue head, red breast and green wings. The less flamboyant female

FIND YOUR PLACE WITHIN NATURE

Bordered by nature preserves and the Atlantic Ocean, Cape Fear Station is the island's finest achievement in community land planning and design. A central village green known as The Common provides a gathering place for outdoor concerts and holiday events, while the oceanfront Shoals Club is just a short cart ride away. Homes here share a traditional coastal Carolina architectural style, but vary in size and setting, from cozy cottages in the maritime forest, to grand residences along the ocean and creek.

bunting is a conservative green and yellow, colors that help hide her presence among the green foliage where the pair make their nest.

Bald Head Island is one of few places in North America where painted buntings abound in summer. In fact, the National Audubon Society has designated the island an Important Bird Area (IBA) for this imperiled species. Painted buntings are in trouble due to loss of nesting habitats along the Atlantic coast, and also because of collecting in their tropical migration and winter grounds for the illegal pet trade. Listening to several male buntings calling from the trees on just this one little hummock in front of me, I could hear and see why this is such an important site.

I knew the tide would soon turn and made my way back to No-Name Creek and continued upstream with the current, passing columns of fiddler crabs that marched away from my approach in regimented fashion. The sheer numbers of retreating crabs made them clearly audible as they scrabbled amongst the cord grass, bumping their hard shells against each other in their panic.

And then I realized not all that I heard was crab. Pulling alongside a patch of needle rush, I was entertained by the leaping antics of hundreds of slender, two-inch-long brown insects called cone-head grasshoppers. These common marsh inhabitants feed on new cord grass blades and, in turn, they are food for hungry birds including the iridescent boat-tailed grackles I saw flying ahead of me. The grasshoppers I surprised fled from the needle rush into nearby cord grass with leap-frog jumps from stem to stem. I tried to pursue the hoppers to get a closer look, but their adeptness at "grass-hopping" made it all but impossible for me to close in on them by kayak.

The marsh grasshoppers provided an exciting culmination to my trek up No-Name Creek. As it turned out, I was able to reach the very head waters of the creek, or at least the point where grass closed in all about, preventing further travel by kayak. And as luck would have it, I reached that zenith point just as the tide began to ebb, which meant I had a most leisurely paddle back to Bald Head Creek with the tide in my favor. Because it was mid-day, the buntings, cardinals and flycatchers had fallen silent. In place of their voices, however, was a gentle rustling sound produced by sea-breeze swept grasses, along with the stridulating chorus from countless cone-head grasshoppers in the grasses around me.

Reentering Bald Head Creek, I was in short order back at the boat ramp where my adventure began. Recalling my travels, I have lasting images of so many wonders of nature that abounded all around me, in a creek with no name, somewhere on the back side of a place called Bald Head Island. And that tidal salt marsh creek, positioned between the Atlantic Ocean to the east and the Cape Fear River to the west, is part and parcel of what makes southeastern North Carolina so unique, wondrous and worth a closer look.

n the mainland, schedules and obligations often relegate relaxation to the back seat. But the homeowners featured here not only find refuge on Bald Head Island, they have created mini-retreats within their island homes.

Wraparound Paradise

The cicadas chirp rhythmically as a lizard, small and bright green, leaps from a tree branch and skitters by on the railing. With the wind rustling the leaves of the oak and palm trees and the shade enveloping the house in a cool embrace, this home bordering The Common at Cape Fear Station is a retreat like no other. In the massive, tangled arms of live oak trees, the Scotts' home sits like a well-built tree house, beckoning you to find escape here.

The open-air porches on both the lower and upper levels are an extension of the interior of the house, offering as much comfort and coziness as any four-walled room. "Because so much of our time here is spent outdoors, we wanted to make the interior spaces easily accessible from the outdoor spaces," Jon Scott explains. "There are lots of doors and stairways that allow you to grab a cold drink in the kitchen upstairs and walk down an outdoor staircase to enjoy it."

You can find Jon and Sharon Scott enjoying their home on the island three to four times a year, when they take a vacation from the hustle and bustle of working in Manhattan, N.Y. But when they arrive at their residence, life takes on a whole new cadence. The name of their house, Prince Machabelli, explains their building approach:

"As children, Sharon and her sister played an indoor game (much to their mother's dismay) in which they'd try to circumnavigate their bedroom without touching the floor—

walking on the dresser, the windowsill, clinging to doorknobs," Jon says. "They called the game 'Prince Machabelli.' When we built a home on Bald Head Island with extensive outdoor deck space that allows us to walk almost all the way around the house without touching the ground, we decided on the name. It's really a throwback to a fun, carefree childhood—which is what Bald Head Island is all about."

The house's reverse floor plan suits the Scott family's needs well. With four children ranging in age from nine to 17 and usually a large contingent of friends and family staying over, the Scotts required a substantial dining area off the upstairs kitchen. Steve Henson, a Featured Builder in the Island Home Center, built a large screened porch that works well in form and function.

"I love to grill, so we designed a space for a big 48-inch grill complete with hood, rotisserie, smoker and dual burners for pots. We can cook an entire meal and serve it all outdoors... it feels like a picnic in a tree house," Jon says. "There's nothing better than grilling a steak or a freshly-caught fish and listening to the surf crashing on East Beach as we enjoy a Bald Head Island meal with family and friends." As an added bonus

to the screened porch, the builder surprised the family with a tile backsplash that mirrors the exterior earth tones and ties the whole room together with the natural surroundings.

This is a well-appointed tree house, to be sure. The rich, warm floors are made of a South American wood called Ipe' (pronounced EE-pay) and are nicely contrasted by crisp white trim and a soothing blue ceiling. Jon humbly admits to crafting the decorative rafter tails himself in his basement workshop in New York and having them trucked over to the island. The bamboo and wicker table and chairs are tastefully simple, and the glass tabletop softly reflects the magnificent live oak tree just outside.

"We wanted space for entertaining and relaxation," Jon notes. From the front door to the top floor, there is no shortage of places to kick off your shoes and relax. Each area feels like its own room, and yet the outside space is not quite finished. "Steve built one section of the deck strong enough to support a large hot tub," Jon says good-humoredly, "so that will be our next addition."

Cottage Charm, Healthy Haven

Porches are a mainstay of Bald Head Island homes, but the heart of many a house is its kitchen. The adage "Everything old is new again," plays out in the kitchen of a marshfront house along Currituck Way in Cape Fear Station built by Brinson Thomas Home Builders.

Designer and decorator Celeste Wegman, of Celeste Wegman Interiors, says she wanted the home to feel like it could have been built 100 years ago, and due to its location, "It was natural for the house to be a casual great room concept with notable doors and windows to take in the views."

While it was important to bring the essence of the outdoors into the interior space, the property owner's severe allergies to Volatile Organic Compounds (VOCs) dictated that every product be researched and deemed "safe" before being used. VOCs are chemicals emitted as gases from certain solids or liquids, such as terpenes, which occur in wood products.

Consequently, each decorating decision from floor to ceiling was influenced by the amount of VOCs emitted.

Celeste makes special note of the natural materials used. Along with the marble countertops and tiles, "The floors in the kitchen, throughout the first floor, the staircase and upstairs hallway are all bamboo," a sustainable hardwood that was stained and sealed. The walls and ceiling are beadboard, painted a light sage green, and contrasting white solid wood beams adorn the ceiling. The beautiful warm color combination of light-colored floor and green paint reflects the marsh colors outside, and the cool blues echo the azure sky beyond the wide windows. All the paint used in the home is Safecoat, manufactured to give off the least amount of VOCs of any paint available.

The countertops are a sleek white honed marble, accented by White Thassos, a natural pure white marble backsplash. A mixture of pendant and recessed lighting emphasizes the voluminous area. The contemporary appliances—a 30" Viking gas range, a 42" built-in Sub Zero side-by-side refrigerator, dishwasher and wine cooler—are integrated into the custom-made, traditionally designed cabinetry.

"This home is a coastal cottage of years past with the modern amenities of today," Celeste says. With a kitchen, we might add, that welcomes family and guests to enjoy the best of both worlds. "Bald Head Island Limited Guest Services, how may I help you?"

Together Space That's Altogether Stunning

Family and friends are also often found at the home of Jim and Helyn Wisner, and for good reason. Built as a full-time residence, their modern beach home along Cape Fear Trail is extraordinary. It is subtly divided into three separate spaces: family space, guest space and together space. While guest space and family space are positioned apart, the together space—which includes the kitchen, the living room and the dining room—sits at the center of the house and has an absolutely stunning view of West Beach.

When designing their home, the Wisners hoped they could "capture the incredible views from every room... the beach, ships in the channel, the Oak Island lighthouse, and magnificent sunsets." That was no small order, but architect Chuck Dietsche and his wife and business partner Anna, of Dietsche + Dietsche Architects PC, delivered on every count.

The living and dining rooms are designed to take full advantage of the large windows that overlook the beach. The dining room boasts a sizeable glass table in its center, resting on an intricate, dark Oriental rug. The mahogany and cream-colored chairs are stately and elegant. Round mirrors hang at each end of the table on the walls.

"We floated the furniture on area rugs to define spaces and rooms for continuity," Chuck notes. The use of color also helps define the room, as the light colors of the white northern maple wood floor and wall paint contrast with the dark hues in the rugs and furniture accents.

No bulky chandelier hangs over the center of the table, but small recessed halogen lights are carefully placed throughout the nine-foot ceiling's grid. The wooden grid, which is continued on the dining room walls, creates a "3-D enclosure," Chuck says, which gives the room depth and texture, especially at night.

"This house is all about ambiguity of space and continuity of space," Chuck explains. The architecture of space is the openness of the room, apparent during the day. Conversely, the architecture of the room is felt when there is less light, and the room feels more enclosed. With the predominant use of glass and mirrors in this room, once the sun sets, a fantastic transformation takes place—the simple furnishings are now reflective, as are the large windows facing the beach. Immediately this room is enclosed and cozy.

The living room is grand and sweeping, highlighted by a Romeo and Juliet balcony and an endless view of the beach. In fact, Chuck says he struggled a bit with so many items competing for the main focal point of the room: the view, the fireplace and the television. Since the view was paramount, Chuck remedied the television issue by hiding it behind a piece of artwork over the fireplace. The artwork opens cabinet-like and reveals the TV, and hides it when not in use.

The fireplace is the "emotional center of the room," according to Chuck, and was delicately surrounded by glass block tile to soften the stark black color. The furniture, simple in nature and chosen in limited earth tones, varies only subtly by texture—a boucle couch, velvet chairs, a silk ottoman. The result is a seamless collection of layers, beautiful individually and as a whole.



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Hollywood at Home

While the television plays second fiddle to the amazing views at the Wisners' house, the owners of a Cape Fear Station home on Portsmouth Way designed a space dedicated almost entirely to the big screen. The family wanted a media room that could double as an overflow bedroom, yet was far enough away from the other bedrooms that late-night movie-viewing wouldn't disturb those not participating. The result is an Oscar-worthy screening room.

A soft forest green leather couch rests on the knotty pine floor, while a matching loveseat and armchair sit on a platform, both facing the retractable 84-inch screen. The raised area for the second row of seating was employed to improve sight lines and extend the number of people who could comfortably watch a movie. Low voltage recessed halogen lights operate on a dimmer to create the perfect ambiance, while room-darkening roman shades in a whimsical gecko print darken the three windows even on a sun-filled day. The small, quiet projector casts a clear picture, and the sound is just like in a theater, with a surround processor and high-end sub woofer and speakers. A handy beverage fridge sits at the end of the top-level couch.

Behind the scenes, so to speak, is careful attention to detail both for now and in the years ahead. When wiring for the room, conduits were included to allow equipment in the theater to feed programming to other parts of the house, and for new connections to be used with the projector. This future-proofs the room no matter what technological advancements come along.

For the family, this room is an escape, as evidenced by the large collection of movies in a cabinet over the projector. Whether Hollywood Central or extra bunking space, this is the quintessential multi-purpose room. But if sleep is beckoning, look no further than the idyllic retreat of the Jobe family.

The Ultimate Room for Repose

The Jobes find respite from busy days at home in Raleigh, N.C., in their beach house getaway. Their Braemar Highlands home sits on the dune ridge overlooking South Beach. For Lee, a cardiologist, and Donna, stay-at-home mom to Tyler (16) and Lydia (11), peace, tranquility and relaxation are a little hard to come by. So for holidays, occasional weekends and one to two weeks in the summer, they head to their port of call, affectionately named "Port Off Call," because, as Donna says, "This is where our family stops for repairs when Lee is off call."

The slower pace is guided by the time the Jobes spend in their master suite, situated on the lower floor of the house and away from the bustle of the kitchen and living room. Elegant arched doorways greet you as you enter the suite, which is subtly divided into three separate areas by additional archways. The sitting room, to the right of the bedroom, overlooks the maritime forest and serves as the couple's "quiet space, free from TV or distractions," Donna notes.

"We usually sit here in the morning and plan our day, talk, or read the paper," she says. At night, Donna and Lee find that "it's a great place to relax to the sound of crickets and tree frogs." A loveseat

and armchair are all that's needed here, along with simple window coverings that filter the light gently into the room.

The bedroom is the heart of the suite, with a high four-poster bed situated under a lofty ceiling. "Even though the bedroom isn't large in scale, the tall ceiling helps the space feel more open," Donna says. Beadboard walls painted a warm beige surround the room, and reflect a similar color found just outside the bedroom windows. "Because the bedroom and bath face the maritime forest, we chose greens, tans and browns from the trees and the soft blue of the sky," Donna explains. The blue is incorporated into the master bathroom as well as in the color palette of the furnishings.

The master bathroom is a masterpiece. "In terms of design and function, the master bath is probably our favorite room," Donna says. It's easy to see why. There is such a feeling of movement to the room, inspired by curves everywhere—the wall to the right of Donna's vanity arcs gracefully, the wall of subway-style glass blocks behind Lee's vanity snakes through the center of the room, and the natural maple cabinetry is beautifully accented with curved handles and drawer pulls. The surprise behind Lee's "floating vanity" is a large walk-through shower.



"We preferred an open shower design," Donna says. "Visually, the shower is hidden behind the glass wall and mirror, which provides privacy. The absence of a door makes cleaning quick and easy," a feature Donna describes as "a must" for their beach home. A BainUltra whirlpool tub is sunken—almost hidden—in the floor for relaxing soaks. Because of the clever placement of the major elements that make a bathroom, well, a bathroom, you don't immediately recognize this room as such. In fact, it looks much like a spa.

"We wanted the house to be clean lined, yet have a casual coastal feel," Donna says. In keeping with that, when she thinks of her Bald Head Island home, the words that spring to mind for her are peaceful, tranquil and relaxing... just what the doctor ordered.

Inside or out, simple or supremely detailed, each of these spaces is special not because of any particular tangible element, but because they are extensions of the dynamic families who inhabit them. These dream homes nurture what makes their owners dream, in daily life or on vacation.

And being well fed in spirit practically guarantees relaxation, no matter which room you're in.

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George P. Mitchell:

Combining the Wisdom of Experience with a Childlike Sense of Wonder

e has been called "a man of true vision," "an extraordinary entrepreneurial genius," and "a corporate and civic leader of extraordinary foresight and charity."

He has won an Ellis Island Medal of Honor, the Hornaday Award for Environmental Achievement, the Aurelio Peccei Lifetime Award dealing with sustainability for human and environmental needs, The Global Tomorrow Coalition's Lorax Award, the Horatio Alger Award, and others too numerous to mention. He has even established his own award: The Mitchell Prize, which has given away hundreds of thousands of dollars to encourage research into environmental and growth issues and problems.

He started a multi-billion dollar oil and energy company from scratch, conceived of and built a thriving city near Houston, Texas, called The Woodlands, almost single-handedly revitalized the historic district of his hometown of Galveston, Texas, and helped make possible the environmentally sensitive development of Bald Head Island. He has given away tens, if not hundreds of millions over the years to various medical, educational, scientific and cultural institutions and organizations.

Yet, one of the most important appointments on George Mitchell's calendar is the one he has kept practically every Saturday morning for years: Around 8 a.m., he meets his hometown friends for coffee at Kroger's deli snack bar in

Galveston. And, according to the story "Low-Key Billionaire," published in the June 22, 2003, issue of *TEXAS* magazine, "there's no place the 84-year-old billionaire would rather be."

"People really love him in Galveston, because he hasn't changed," said Galveston businessman Tilman Fertitta, speaking of the son of illiterate Greek immigrants who grew up rags-poor in depression-era Galveston and rose to astronomical achievements. "He really is a normal person."

The Patient Patriarch

As if his accomplishments weren't already impressive enough, consider that George and his wife Cynthia also reared 10 children during the same period that he was wildcatting in the oil industry, and building Mitchell Energy and Development. The middle two children, at numbers five and six, are Mark and Kent, executive vice president and president, respectively, of Bald Head Island Limited, the master developers of the island since 1983.

"Dad worked a lot when we were growing up," said Mark, "but he was very present on weekends." Mark spoke of his mother taking all of the children to their modest beach house on Galveston Island for the entire summer, with his father commuting by train from Houston to join them from Thursday evening until Monday morning.

"In the fall and winter, we would go to Cook's Branch on weekends," he continued, referring to a property his family owns north of Houston that has expanded over the years to encompass more than 5,000 acres. Now home to Cook's Branch Conservancy, the spread is a research and preservation habitat for indigenous species, philosophically akin to the Bald Head Island Conservancy.

According to the aforementioned *TEXAS* article, "One of Mitchell's pleasures in life is helping his children with their many business, artistic and charitable endeavors." When Mark and Kent discovered Bald Head Island in 1983 and had an opportunity to purchase all of the undeveloped land it encompassed, George helped his sons secure the property.

"We mistakenly thought we were going to have access to the team that developed The Woodlands," said Mark, speaking of the renowned consortium of planners, architects and environmentalists who created the sole survivor of the 13 HUD-sponsored new towns attempted in the United States in the 1960s and '70s. The Woodlands, located 27 miles north of Houston, is a vibrant 27,000-acre incorporated city, with mixed residential, commercial and research components. Dismayed at the plight of American cities during those turbulent years of social unrest, George built The Woodlands through Mitchell Energy and Development, a publicly traded company that was

looking to diversify during a slump in the oil industry.

Instead, explained Mark, "When we acquired the island, Dad felt it would not be right to utilize the resources of a public company for a private investment," so he and Kent, with constant collaboration with George, were on their own in developing Bald Head Island. They did, however, remember their father's lessons of environmental responsibility and utilizing progressive thinkers to address the issues, and successfully applied those concepts in the development of the island.

Over the years, George Mitchell invested large sums of money to help see that Bald Head Island Limited could remain true to its original vision, and not be pressured to make long-term decisions motivated by short-term profits. Suffice it to say, Bald Head Island would be a vastly different place today had developers without access to such resources attempted to develop the community.

"The financial viability of this development was questionable in the early days," said Mark, "but Dad believed in what we were doing and helped us get it done. Now it has turned out to be a reasonable long-term investment, but the vast majority of the profits have gone back into improving the island, such as the new ferries, grocery and hardware store, the Shoals Club and the Deep Point mainland terminal. The parts of operations that are profitable fund those that are not."

Mark said his Dad last visited the island in 2005, and he was pleased with what he saw. "He always said that from a family perspective, it is one of the best planned and executed projects we've been involved in."

Thinking—And Acting—Globally

However generous Mr. and Mrs. Mitchell have been in helping their children with their enterprises, George has also commented that he and Cynthia "have worked hard to raise their children to be independent and successful, separate and apart from them." Bald Head Island Limited has recently been able to pay back George for the original loans, a milestone that was particularly gratifying for the brothers.

Furthermore, the bulk of the senior Mitchells' fortune will be allocated to the Cynthia and George Mitchell Foundation, not personally passed on to their children. Instead, the siblings inherit the social responsibility of their parents and sit on the foundation board, charged with administering those vast foundation resources, to make a positive impact on the world.

"One of the biggest issues on my father's mind now is sustainability," said Mark, "or how mankind is going to survive given the Earth's limited resources. With the foundation, we actually have enough resources to make an impact."

In 2000, the policy arm of HARC (Houston Advanced Research Center) was renamed the Mitchell Center for Sustainable Development. The center rose out of George Mitchell's concern over worldwide environmental, population and resource depletion issues. George personally contributed more than \$30 million to the center over 20 years to fund research projects and annual seminars, and funded a \$10 million National Academies Study on sustainable development and world population growth.

The (Very) Big Picture

"What amazes me about George," offered former HARC president John Vasselli, "is that he looks at the world like there are no challenges too big; we should go out and solve them, and do it right away."

In addition to actively addressing concerns about the sustainability of the earth, George has taken on another gargantuan question: the origin of the universe.

In 2002, George and Cynthia made a \$2 million commitment to Texas A&M University to establish the George P. and Cynthia W. Mitchell Institute for Fundamental Physics and Astronomy, as well as the Stephen Hawking Chair in Fundamental Physics. He gave an additional \$200,000 to help with start-up costs, and even agreed to help solicit the matching

funds needed to complete the project.

As preparation for making this gift, George met with Stephen Hawking, the extraordinary Cambridge-based scientist who became famous for his pioneering research on black holes and quantum mechanics, as well as his best-selling books, A Brief History of Time and The Universe in a Nutshell. Hawking agreed to spend a month at Texas A&M, leading a contingent of the world's top physicists, addressing questions pertaining to the origin of the universe.

A consensus builder who has a history of bringing together the most progressive thinkers in any given field to brainstorm solutions, George endowed the symposium because he believes, "There is no substitute for sustained group interaction, focused upon a set of problems of common interest, to spark new insights."

Since 2004, Texas A&M and the University of Texas at Austin have been involved in another high-profile, out-of-thisworld project. As a result of a \$1.75 million gift to the two Texas institutions by George and Cynthia Mitchell, these universities join Harvard, Michigan, Arizona, Carnegie and MIT in work on the Giant Magellan Telescope (GMT) to be built in Chile. The GMT is said to be four times more powerful than the greatest telescopes now in use, able to push time back 10 times farther than the Hubble Space Telescope's 13.7 billion years, and produce images 10 times sharper than those of the Hubble.

Good Works, Good Medicine

Another area that has benefited enormously from the Mitchells' philanthropy is the field of medical education and research. Among the many projects they have either made significant contributions toward, or wholly funded themselves, are the endowment of a medical professorship at Duke University, a \$2 million gift to Baylor College of Medicine for research into therapies to prevent heart attacks and strokes, and a \$20 million gift for the George and Cynthia Mitchell Basic Sciences Research Building at the University of Texas M.D. Anderson Cancer Center. The latter, a building on the campus of perhaps the number one cancer research and treatment hospital in the world, has been called "an incubator for a community of scholarship" that will "promote collaborative efforts that promise to result in landmark scientific discoveries for a host of diseases, including cancer. Ultimately, such key information from medical breakthroughs will reverberate worldwide."

But perhaps the cause closest to the Mitchell family's own heart is their funding of the George P. and Cynthia Woods Mitchell Center for Alzheimer's Disease Research at the University of Texas Medical Branch, and a \$2 million pledge

and contribution to the Alzheimer's Disease and Memory Disorder Center in the Department of Neurology at the Baylor College of Medicine. Cynthia Mitchell was diagnosed with Alzheimer's Disease several years ago, so the family has a deeply personal interest in issues of aging and longevity.

A Woman's Touch

As the story goes, Cynthia Mitchell and her identical twin sister Pamela were traveling by train to a Texas A&M football game in the fall of 1941. When Cynthia's date became intoxicated, she removed herself from his company. George Mitchell also happened to be on that train and, being a man known to recognize opportunity, walked over and introduced himself.

In the 65 years since, following a double ceremony in which Pamela also married a man she met on that same fateful train ride, Cynthia Mitchell has been by her husband's side as they raised their children and grew an empire.

"My mother was into countless things," said Mark, reminiscing about his childhood. "She was the scout leader, the one who was always there." Mark said his mother's philosophy of childrearing was that it was easier to keep track of 10 children if they were all at home, so their house became the center of everything. "There was so much activity, with all of my siblings and all of our friends there," said Mark. "There was never a dull moment."

While his father is not much of a tourist, Mark said his mother loves to travel. "She is extremely interested in other cultures, languages and art. She wanted us to have a view of the world beyond our American experience."

Cynthia's generous nature and love of the arts have inspired yet another category of philanthropy for the Mitchells. The aforementioned Aurelio Peccei Lifetime Award was actually given to a "husband and wife team of visionary thinkers as well as 'doers,'" said the literature explaining the honor, and among the achievements listed is Cynthia's establishment of the Global Children's Foundation, whose work is to establish safe havens for young victims of war and tyranny.

Her namesake Cynthia Woods Mitchell Pavilion at The Woodlands is a regional venue for a wide range of musical performances. At the University of Houston, her alma mater, George funded the Cynthia Woods Mitchell Center for the Arts in honor of his wife, creating a center of artistic collaboration, including visual art, creative writing, music and theater. The couple has also given generously to the Houston Symphony, the Houston Grand Opera and the Houston Ballet, among many other arts organizations.

Motivated by pride in and responsibility toward George's

hometown, the Mitchells launched a sweeping restoration program in downtown Galveston in the 1980s. It has been reported that over three decades, the Mitchells spent \$40-65 million of their own money renovating more than 17 properties. The *Houston Business Journal* said, "As a personal passion, Mitchell has almost single-handedly transformed Galveston's historical Strand District into an economic engine and tourist destination."

During the project, Cynthia was heavily involved in the design and plan of the buildings' interiors. Upon completion, George established the Cynthia Woods Mitchell Fund for Historic Interiors, a grant program endowed in 1997 at the National Preservation Conference as "his way of paying tribute to her, and recognizing her special talents and contributions to historic interiors." The \$2 million endowment has funded restoration projects in both urban and rural areas of 27 states.

Life's Lessons, Applied

On Bald Head Island, the Mitchell brothers' tribute to their parents' influence is seen in more than just the neighborhoods that are meticulously planned and executed. It is visible in the 200 acres of rare maritime forest that were set aside in 1993 through a deal with the State of North Carolina, in which the company donated half of the land. The Mitchells also gave one half of the initial budget for the Bald Head Island Conservancy, helped establish the Old Baldy Foundation, and donated the gorgeous tract of land on which the Village Chapel of Bald Head Island now stands.

Perhaps inspired by their mother, both Mark and Kent have expressed a desire to have more cultural offerings available on the island, and to that end have sponsored events such as the international "No Boundaries" artist colony.

Mark said the values of his parents that he most wants to pass on to his children are a love of nature and sense of wonder about the universe. "You can see it in people's faces when they really appreciate what they are seeing," he said. "They sit in awe of it all. So many people are on the verge of living in an artificial or virtual world. We need to get back to authentic, natural, real places... to be in the moment, actually engaged with nature. That is the way my parents raised us, and it's what we are trying to accomplish on Bald Head Island."

Skinny Dip

by Carl Hiasson Warner Books, 355 pages

Vintage Carl Hiasson, *Skinny Dip* is fast paced and incredibly funny. Here, too, is his ever-present, passionate commentary on mankind's ravages of his beloved Florida wilderness. In his newest novel, an attractive heiress named Joey Perrone is thrown overboard from a cruise ship by her husband Chaz, a deplorable marine biologist who is as devoid of expertise in his field as he is of scruples. Joey is rescued by ex-cop Mick Stranahan and together they plot to get even with Chaz.

The Old Man and The Boy

by Robert Ruark Henry Holt & Company, Incorporated; 320 pages

One of Southport's favorite native sons, Robert Ruark first published this heartwarming classic about a young boy and his grandfather in 1957. The elder is teacher and guide as the two hunt and fish in the North Carolina countryside, and the lessons teach the child much more than how to cock a rifle or bait a hook. The grandson learns about taking responsibility, making choices and becoming a man.

The Mermaid Chair

by Sue Monk Kidd Penguin Books, 368 pages

Fans of the best-seller The Secret Life of Bees will pick up on the consistent larger themes of self-discovery, love and family ties, but will find few character or plot similarities between the two novels. In The Mermaid Chair, Kidd speaks in the voice of Jessie Sullivan, a 42-year-old woman who must return to her hometown of tiny Egret Island, a Bald Head Island-like refuge off the coast of South Carolina, to attend to her fanatically Catholic mother who has (perhaps intentionally) chopped off her own finger. During her stay, Jessie deals with her mother's possible mental illness, hidden secrets about her father's death 33 years earlier, disillusionment with her own marriage, and a very confusing attraction to a monk at the island's monastery. Like Bees, The Mermaid Chair is emotionally rich and deeply Southern.

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



A LIGHTKEEPER'S DAY: SEDGWICK SPRINGS AND THE OLD BALDY LIGHTHOUSE, 1835

A November night at Bald Head Light Station, 1835

The clock on the mantel chimed softly. It was midnight, and keeper Sedgwick Springs needed to tend the lamps in the lighthouse. Though his bones creaked like his rope bed, he pulled himself up and slowly laced his boots. He stoked the fire in his bedroom and lit the lantern. The tabby cat roused herself from the hearth and followed him. Taking his wool jacket off the hook, he pulled it on carefully—his shoulder was so stiff these days—and

reached for his hat. He would need it for this cold, windy night.

The Bald Head lighthouse was not a far walk from the cottage, but the chill of the wind made it feel longer. Keeper Springs was ready, as he always was, to check the light from the lamps in the lanthorn (the lantern room) at the top of the lighthouse and make sure the flames were burning well. Fifteen oil-burning lamps showed a fixed light to ships at sea, and he checked the lamp flames at least once every night; the glass lenses (which helped make the lamps brighter) also had to be kept clean of lamp soot and smoke. If the weather was stormy, he had to check the lamps more often.

Keeper Springs had been following this routine regularly for twenty-five years. He was now eighty-three years old, quite ready to retire.

He wondered when the U.S. Lighthouse Service would appoint a new keeper.

Keeping the light shining in the Bald Head lighthouse was Sedgwick Springs's main duty as a lighthouse keeper. He might be old, and the work seemed to get harder every year, but he still made it up the stairs several times a day to do his work. He knew this lighthouse was important to the ships navigating the Cape Fear River. The shallow, choppy shoals at the tip of Smith Island—past the point known as Bald Head were hazardous even in clear weather. The light warned ships away from these dangerous waters. What if the lenses had become smoky because of a dirty, untrimmed wick? And what if a ship ran aground and the cargo and crew were in danger because he had not checked the lamps? Keeper Springs was not ever going to let that happen.







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Built in 1817, Old Baldy is North Carolina's oldest standing lighthouse, and its safekeeping is entrusted to the Old Baldy Foundation. Formed in 1985 and funded through private donations, as well as state and federal grants, the Foundation provides educational information about the historic structure, its keepers and its role in the island's seafaring history. It also handles on-going restoration and repairs.

Admission to climb Old Baldy is granted through the Smith Island Museum of History, a replica of the original lighthouse keeper's cottage that displays period artifacts and houses a gift shop.
















Lightkeeper Sedgwick Springs

He braved the cold wind and the dark and walked to the door of the lighthouse. Once inside, he looked up the tall, narrow space and saw the glow from the lamps at the top. They looked bright enough, but the wicks had to be checked. He headed for the stairs and started the climb. The orange tabby cat followed him for a little ways. She was always good company.

Keeper Springs knew each of the one hundred and ten stairs and five platforms by heart, though he carried his lantern to light the way. He rested for a minute at each platform. On the last platform, he set his lantern into a nook in the wall. He would not need it from here because the lighthouse lamps kept the upper part of the lighthouse so bright.

He had to climb a small ladder into the lanthorn. There he went about his work, trimming the wicks and checking the oil level in the lamps. He took a clean linen cloth and wiped the lenses. He looked out to the dark sea but saw no signal lamp glowing from passing ships. From the top of the lighthouse he could see the sandy outline of the island and the edges of the river—a good sign because it meant the sky was clear. He heard the wind whistle through the vents, but it was warm in the lanthorn. He finished his tasks and headed down. At dawn he would return and snuff the flames to save oil. Maybe he could get some sleep before the morning chores.

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THE HORRIGAN HOME

at Cape Fear Station

For Brian and Jennifer Horrigan, Bald Head Island is all about connections—to family, to friends, and to the land itself. Their lovely island home, built in the Maritime Watch section of Cape Fear Station, is a conduit for all of the above.

Name a geographic feature that makes Bald Head Island special, and chances are good that the Horrigans can see it from

their windows and porches. Miles of beautiful beaches and endless Atlantic Ocean stretch north and south just across the street from their home on Station House Way. The point of Cape Fear is clearly visible from the southeastern corner of the house, while the expansive salt marsh, spanning all the way to Old Baldy Lighthouse and Harbour Village, presents picture-perfect

panoramas from the northwestern windows. There is even a parcel of protected maritime forest in the island's shear zone bordering the property, providing a lovely privacy screen on the back of the house.

"We knew the house would have great views," said Jennifer Horrigan, as she began a tour of their home, "but we never expected everything we got. We couldn't believe it when we realized we could see the point and Old Baldy, and even the Oak Island lighthouse across the river."

Beyond the captivating views in every direction, the Horrigan home is further distinguished by its enviable location: on a corner of Cape Fear Station's ocean-side avenue, Station House Way, and just down the street from the Shoals Club. It was designed and built to serve dual roles: as a cocoon for their immediate family of four and as a gathering spot capable of accommodating eight overnight guests and as many as 18 people for dinner.

Friends and Family

Brian and Jennifer live with their daughters Olivia (13) and Erica (11) in Wilmington, N.C., less than an hour's drive from the Bald Head Island ferry terminal. The proximity makes quick island getaways very convenient, and while they visit in every season, the girls' academic and extracurricular schedules make coming to the island during the school year more of a challenge.

"But that's what's nice about the whole Bald Head Island experience," said Brian. "Kids get to have down time and be kids, and parents get to relax more, because we're not distracted running the kids here and there."

Jennifer laughed recalling Erica's comment after learning they were going to spend a couple of weeks on Bald Head Island soon after school was out for the summer. "She said, 'Good, I need a rest,'" reported Jennifer. "Even at 11, she recognizes the less demanding, slower pace."


While the Horrigans treasure their family time—including extended family whenever possible—one of their annual highlights is a reunion of college friends who spend several days together on the island.


Brian attended the University of Richmond, and since graduating in 1985, six close friends and their families have gotten together once or twice a year. "We go to the beach in the summer and skiing in the winter," said Jennifer, who is one of only three out of the 12 adults in the group who did not attend the University of Richmond. "At first, we met on the New Jersey shore or up at Bethany Beach, Delaware," she continued, "but once we brought everybody to Bald Head Island in 2003, nobody wanted to go anywhere else. They love it here as much as we do."

One member of the group enjoys it so much, reported Brian, he has also purchased property in Cape Fear Station. "He saw how quickly coastal land sold out in the north," said Brian, "and he felt he had missed that opportunity. He didn't want to be guilty of the woulda-coulda-shoulda mistake again, and he recognizes how special the island is."









Building a Legacy

Situated on a dune ridge that descends to celebrated East Beach, Maritime Watch homesites rise above their adjacent oceanfront neighbors, creating magnificent elevated views. When preparing the lot for building, Brian said, existing sand was redistributed in order to raise their property even higher. The Horrigans also asked that the remaining sand be left where it had been randomly deposited: on a dune that fills the space between their front porch and the road. "Keeping it natural, instead of hauling the sand away to put in a lawn," said Brian, "is in keeping with how the island is developed and it gives us additional privacy on the front of the house."

Architectural covenants govern house types in Cape Fear Station, and the Horrigans said working within them was no problem at all. "There was nothing we wanted to do that we couldn't," said Jennifer. "We understand that the guidelines protect the integrity of the neighborhood—and our investment—by giving it a consistent look."

Jennifer said they got permission to position the house to take advantage of the ocean views between the houses across the street, and in order to save a pretty cedar tree, they placed the crofter/garage a little closer to the road.

It was also helpful that the Horrigans chose an architect who understood the particular considerations involved with building on Bald Head Island.


"Mark Saulnier, our architect, had just returned from a trip to Cape Cod when he designed our house," said Jennifer, "so there is a Nantucket influence. The tower came from that trip."

The tower is one of the most distinguishing features of a very distinguished exterior. As stipulated in the covenants, the house is a story-and-a-half design. The first floor is covered in siding made of Hardi-Plank, a material that looks like wood but requires very little maintenance, while the second floor and crofter are clad in cedar shakes.

Fifteen rocking chairs line up around the extra-wide porch that wraps the lower level, creating an open-air sitting room with a tongue-and-groove ceiling. A second story porch is more intimate, but only by comparison. It is large enough to breezily handle the various cushioned chairs and teak tables that furnish the space, which Brian and Jennifer concur is the most popular spot in—or outside of—the house.

Wide columns flank the entrance to the porch, leading to the custom-milled mahogany double front doors. Upon entry, visitors are greeted by a gallery of Claude Howell lithographs and other artwork hung on a beadboard background that reaches from floor to ceiling and extends up the stairs.

A reverse floorplan is the obvious choice for homesites offering multiple views, and the Horrigans have maximized the layout. The open living spaces upstairs include a den with built-in shelves and cabinets designed to match the kitchen cabinets; another seating area in front of the doors that lead to the porch; and a strikingly dramatic





kitchen that features black cabinets, stainless steel appliances and granite countertops flecked with amber hues. The focal point, however, is tucked into a corner—the aforementioned tower houses a custom-made dining table that is 94 inches in diameter. Built-in benches follow the tower's contours, and more traditional dining room chairs make up the balance of the seating.

Originally, the tower was designed as a mini-retreat, a reading nook with one or two chairs. However, when Brian realized the views from the wraparound windows, it became clear that a dining room would be the space's best use. "It wouldn't be optimized any other way," he said. "We spend so much time there—eating, talking, playing board games. So many people can be there at once, and there isn't a bad seat."

Throughout the living areas, white-washed pine beadboard meets taupe painted walls that give way to a stained pine ceiling. White trim contrasts with the camel wall color, and the windows in the common areas have been left bare to frame the views and maximize the light. Jennifer pointed out that while the abundance of windows (there are 32 on the main floor alone) is one of the house's most desirable features, "all that glass can seem cold or hard, so I needed to keep the house warm and bright, and to soften it some."

The upstairs rooms are dominated by neutrals, with various shades of green providing accents. "I wanted minimal, not cluttered," said Jennifer. "I was going for comfort and simplicity, and a focus on the views."







Perhaps because Jennifer chose to decorate the house herself rather than hire a decorator, she is deeply passionate about many of the elements. "We wanted a 1920s beach cottage feel," she said, "so we paid attention when picking materials. It was our intention for the house to feel older than it is."

The planks of the Brazilian cherry floors, for example, are 5.25 inches wide, a detail Jennifer insisted upon. "My mom grew up in a farmhouse that is almost 150 years old," she explained. "This floor reminds me of that place; I'm just drawn to it."

Slightly distressed cabinets and polished pewter knobs further the ambiance of another era, as do the chrome plumbing fixtures. But the interior is multi-dimensional, and a bit eclectic. "We started with the 1920s feel," she said, "but then deviated from it in places."

Jennifer said that because of the extraordinary views, she "didn't really want the beachy look for the living areas." Before building their Cape Fear Station home, the Horrigans built a house in the maritime forest that they have since sold. "There, I wanted to bring the beach in because the location was not near the beach. Here," she said with obvious understatement, "that's not necessary."

Rounding out the main floor is a guest suite. The bedroom has dark stained furniture and white matelassé bedspreads. Colorful, South Pacific-inspired prints hang on the walls.

The adjacent bathroom is accessible from the hall and, as is the case with all of the bathrooms, there are no cabinets and drawers. Jennifer teased that she blew the cabinet budget in the kitchen, but she was actually inspired by a hotel in St. John's, USVI, that used straw baskets under sinks to hold supplies. She fell in love with the look, as well as the functional aspect of it. "At the beach, life is less fussy, so you can just toss your things in a basket and you're done," she said. It keeps the clutter out of sight, but everything that's needed is close at hand.

On the lower floor, the master bedroom is to the left upon entrance, and the room is dominated by a king-sized cherry bed, with intricately carved posts. A pocket door opens into the master bathroom, which is as beautiful as a lavish spa. Neutral stones tile the floor, and granite countertops that Jennifer said reminded her of a Picasso painting infuse the room with drama. There is no shower door, and a glass partition between the shower stall and bathtub keeps the room light and open, and treats the person in the shower to an ocean view.

Even though there are two more bedrooms on the first level, Olivia and Erica share a room that has two double beds. "They have separate rooms at home," said Jennifer, "but they have always shared on Bald Head Island. There was never a question." Here, a bit of the beach house decorating theme comes into play with Hawaiian floral print bedspreads in green and blue. A corner of the girls' room is also the foundation portion of the tower, and a low table with four bean bag chairs provides the perfect spot for puzzles and games with friends.

The surf-inspired theme is continued in a bathroom at the end of the hall that is shared when guests are staying in the adjacent bedroom. The huge shower stall has double heads that suspend from the ceiling, and beautiful teal ceramic tiles interspersed with glass tile accents are everywhere—even on the floor. Three-dimensional art of sea creatures livens the walls.

The final room on the entry level is a very large laundry room, accessible from the foyer or from the porch on the back of the house. Dozens of colorful beach towels are stacked for the grabbing and straw beach hats hang on pegs awaiting their moments in the sun.

Detached from the house, a two-cart garage offers a crofter above it that serves as the fifth bedroom. The crofter's white wicker furniture looks fresh and crisp, decked out in red, white and khaki stripes. A bathroom with a shower offers uninterrupted views of the point of Cape Fear, and the black and white tile floor is art decoinspired, another nod to a bygone era.

At the back of the crofter, an oversized outdoor shower is embraced by the thick forest vegetation, which functions as a natural privacy screen. Brian created a swinging door that can be latched open or pulled into place when needed.

Just as the tour was ending, Olivia, Erica and a friend returned from a crabbing expedition on the marsh, and all were howling with laughter. The last one to arrive, five-foot-six-inch Olivia rounded the corner covered in thick, black mud up to her waist, the consequence of having jumped from the pier in search of larger prey. She said she thought only her feet would sink into the soft ground, but immediately found her legs completely submerged. The outdoor shower was called into use, but only after pictures of the slightly stunned, but thoroughly amused, teenager had been taken to document the moment.

The event seemed to punctuate an earlier comment by Brian. "Bald Head Island really encourages kids to get out and explore," he said. "It's a wholesome atmosphere, a throwback to when we were kids."

Even more than that, perhaps, it's link between past and present; an experience shared between generations. And for the Horrigan family on Bald Head Island, another connection made.

Tenderloin Dinner

Grilled Tenderloin of Beef with Jumbo Lump Crabmeat and Horseradish Havarti Cheese, served with Truffle Mashed Potatoes and Haricot Verts. Serves six.

Truffle Mashed Potatoes

6 Yukon Gold potatoes, peeled and diced 1 pound butter 2 cups half & half 1/4 cup white truffle oil Salt, to taste

Bring a pot of water to a boil and add potatoes. Cook until soft (approximately 10 minutes). While potatoes are boiling, in a separate saucepan, melt butter. When melted, add half & half. Keep warm on low heat on stove. Strain cooked potatoes. While still hot, place in mixing bowl and mash. Add oil, butter and half & half mixture. Mix until potatoes are desired thickness. Add salt to taste. For presentation, place mashed potatoes in pastry bag with a plastic star tip and pipe onto plate.

Haricot Verts

1 pound French cut green beans 3 cups salt 3 oz. butter

In a saucepan bring three quarts of water to a boil. While waiting for the water to come to temperature, remove the tips of the green beans. Once water has come to a rolling boil, add salt. Have bowl of ice water ready nearby. Place beans in salted water and cook for one minute, remove and strain. Immediately place beans in the ice water to shock them and stop the cooking process. Heat sauté pan on high and add butter. Sauté beans for approximately one-and-a-half minutes. Beans should still have crunch in them.

Grilled Tenderloin

8 oz. beef tenderloin, per person2 oz. jumbo lump crabmeat1 thin slice of horseradish havarti cheese

Season and grill tenderloin to desired temperature. Once cooked, top with crabmeat and cheese. Place tenderloin into a 375° oven

Vanilla Bean Crème Brulee

Makes 12 4-oz. servings

8 oz. egg yolk

- 1 cup granulated suga
- 1 whole vanilla bean or 4 oz. vanilla extrac
- 1 at, heavy crean

Preheat oven to 300°.

In a saucepan, bring heavy cream to a simmer. Cut vanilla bean in half long ways and scrape out the inside, adding to the heavy cream. (You can substitute 4 oz. of vanilla extract if you don't have vanilla bean.) Add sugar to heavy cream.

Place egg yolks in a separate bowl and add cream mixture slowly while constantly stirring with a wooden spoon. (It's important to add the cream slowly so that the hot cream doesn't allow the eggs to cook.) Strain into another container

Place 12 4-oz. oven-safe crème bruled dishes, with at least four-inch sides, in a baking pan. Pour mixture evenly into all the dishes and place in preheated oven. Add water to pan, so that the waterline is about halfway up the sides of the dishes. Bake for 20 minutes, then turn the pan around and cook for another 20 minutes. Allow at least two hours for cooling.

When ready to serve, sprinkle sugar in an even layer over the crème brulee.
With a small, kitchen-safe
blowtorch, cook the
sugar on top until
lightly brown.

for two minutes or long enough to melt the cheese. Serve the tenderloin with truffle mashed potatoes and sautéed haricot verts.



Red Snapper Dinner

Tortilla-Encrusted Red Snapper over Jalapeño Cornbread with Papaya Salsa.

Papaya Salsa

- 3 papayas, skinned, seeded, diced ¼ inch x ¼ inch
- 1 tbsp. fresh chopped cilantro
- ½ cup diced red & yellow bell peppers,¼ inch x ¼ inch
- 1 green onion, thinly sliced
- 2 tbsp. red onion, finely chopped
- 3 tbsp. honey
- 2 dashes Tabasco sauce
- 2 tsp. lemon juice, fresh

Mix all ingredients and let sit, overnight if possible.

Jalapeño Cornbread

2 cups yellow corn meal2 cups all-purpose flour

- 1 tsp. salt
- 1 tsp. baking soda
- 11/2 tsp. baking powder
- ½ pound butter, melted
- 2 cups sour cream
- 6 eggs
- 7 oz. jalapeños, chopped
- 1 cup sugar
- ½ cup buttermilk
- 2 cups cheddar cheese, shredded

Mix all ingredients. Pour batter evenly onto greased baking sheet and bake at 350° for about 30 minutes until light brown. Let cool and cut into squares.


Tortilla Encrusted Red Snapper

Red & blue corn tortilla chips, separated

- 2 tsp. cumin
- 2 tsp. salt
- 2 cups flour
- 1 egg, beaten slightly
- 4-5 oz. red snapper, per person


Take equal parts of red and blue corn tortilla chips and place them, separately, in a food processor to grind them. Sprinkle cumin and salt into ground chips. Place ground chips in a shallow pan with red on one side, blue on the other, touching in the middle of the pan. Set up a breading station: flour in the first pan, egg wash in the next, tortilla chips in the third. Bread snapper by placing flesh side down into flour, egg wash, and then into the middle of the tortilla pan where the red and blue chips meet. Place snapper in a shallow baking pan with a splash of fresh lemon juice, white wine and small amount of water. Bake at 400° for about four minutes.

To serve, place warm square of cornbread on middle of plate. Rest tortilla-encrusted snapper on top of cornbread square. Spoon papaya salsa over the top of the snapper and garnish with a sprig of fresh cilantro.

Crab Cakes

Makes approximately six crab cakes; serves two per person.

½ cup (or less) breadcrumbs

1/4 tsp. dry mustard

- 1 egg
- 2 tsp. Worcestershire sauce
- 2 tbsp. mayonnaise
- 1 tsp. lemon juice, fresh
- 1 tbsp. mustard
- 1 tsp. fresh dill, mixed herbs or parsley flakes
- 2 tsp. Aunt Rida's Southwest Seasoning, or any good seafood seasoning
- 1 pound crab meat (½ lump crab meat and ½ backfin crab meat)
- 1 tbsp. melted butter

In a mixing bowl, mix all ingredients except the crab meat. Gently fold in the crab meat, trying not to break the lumps. Shape into cakes. Pan-fry in butter until evenly browned on each side. Each cake should reach an internal temperature of 165°.



KEEPING UP APPEARANCES

Meet Some of Bald Head Island's Most Enduring "Residents"

Breathtaking scenic beauty, abundant natural resources, comfortable climate and inviting ways to make a living have drawn people to Bald Head Island for hundreds of years. Native Americans were catching fish and hunting game here centuries before the first European explorers discovered the Cape Fear region area in the early 1500s. In the early 1700s, pirates frequently avoided capture by hiding on Bald Head Island, while seasoned river pilots guided legitimate ships safely around the treacherous shoals and sandbars to and from the mouth of the Cape Fear River.

Brave lighthouse keepers came to stand watch in the lantern room at the first Cape Fear Light, built on the cape at the southeastern corner of Bald Head Island. Construction workers arrived in the early 1800s to start building the second Cape Fear Light, affectionately known as Old Baldy, and the outbreak of the Civil War brought both Confederate and Union soldiers. Summertime beachgoers began joining the lighthouse and life saving station keepers on the island in the early 1900s.


According to local legend, some of the people who have visited, lived or worked on Bald Head Island evidently have decided to stay—indefinitely. These old-timers are said to make appearances from time to time, so be on the lookout for folks who seem perhaps a little...other-worldly. You, too, may be fortunate enough to enjoy a personal encounter with one or more of Bald Head Island's permanent residents.

The Lovely Lady in a Long, Flowing Dress

If you see a lovely, but very sad, young woman wearing a long, flowing dress, she could be Theodosia Burr Alston, wife of South Carolina's governor Joseph Alston and daughter of Vice President Aaron Burr. Theodosia unintentionally arrived on Bald Head Island about 1813. Although no one knows for sure exactly how Theodosia came to be here, most historians suspect pirates had something to do with it.

Theodosia had set sail on *The Patriot*, a small pilot boat, from Georgetown, S.C., under the cover of darkness on December 30, 1812, eagerly looking forward to meeting her father in New York City and giving him an exquisite oil painting of her in a gold frame. But a few days into the voyage, the ship, crew and passengers disappeared somewhere off the North Carolina coast. Years later two captured pirates confessed that they had helped attack *The Patriot* near the entrance to the Cape Fear River. They reported watching Theodosia, along with the other passengers and the crew, walk the plank. Another pirate recalled that Theodosia had desperately pleaded for her life.

Other sources, however, suggest that the pirates did indeed save Theodosia from the plank and took her to their hideout on Bald Head Island. Some local traditions suggest that the overwhelming despair of never being rescued drove poor Theodosia to either lose her mind or drown herself in the sea.



Whatever the unfortunate circumstances surrounding her uncompleted journey to New York, Theodosia reportedly has been seen so often on Bald Head Island that a cozy, welcoming bed-and-breakfast bears her name. Even now, almost 200 years later, Theodosia—or at least her legend—seems to be very much alive.

Storyteller Brooks Newton Preik, who collected many of the area's ghost stories for her book *Haunted Wilmington and the Cape Fear Coast*, notes that as part of a recent presentation she retold the story of two World War II Coast Guardsmen who had encountered Theodosia not just one night, but two nights, while they were patrolling Bald Head Island's beaches on horseback. A wide-eyed young woman came up to Brooks after the program and said she had never heard the story about Theodosia before—but her mother and father had seen the same woman not very long ago!

As for the beautiful portrait Theodosia was taking to her father in New York, Brooks extensively researched what is known about it and obtained a photograph of the historic painting for her book. She learned that it was salvaged from an abandoned ship that washed ashore miles up the coast near Nags Head in January 1813. After quite an amazing journey of its own, it landed at Yale University's Lewis Walpole Library in Farmington, Conn.

The Brave River Pilots, Uncovered

In the 1800s the captains of ships sailing around Bald Head Island depended on experienced river pilots to help them safely navigate

around Frying Pan Shoals and other underwater hazards. Enterprising river pilots camped out on the high bluff at the west end of Bald Head Island and waved at approaching ships, trying to get the attention of the crews before they ran aground on a shoal or sandbar. To make it easier to see and be seen, the river pilots cut down the trees and either cleared away or stomped down the grass, leaving the promontory "bald," thus giving rise to the island's unusual name.

During an unusually cold spell one January in the late 1800s, four of these seemingly fearless men hurriedly left their shelter on the bluff and rushed to their boats to pull a ship off a sandbar. Sleet made the rescue particularly difficult, and by the time the river pilots freed the ship and set her on a safe course, they were chilled to the bone. To make matters worse, the sleet had extinguished their campfire and soaked their firewood, which in their haste they had left uncovered. The shivering rescuers wrapped themselves in their blankets and huddled together for warmth, but hypothermia took its toll. They froze to death.

For years after this tragic event, the few people who lived near the river pilots' campsite on West Beach noticed that spare blankets simply disappeared from their homes, and at least one person reported seeing a blanket running on the beach. Perhaps the river pilots are still trying to get warm—or perhaps one of the maritime forest creatures has decided a blanket or two would make a fine bed. Either way, you might want to hang on to your blanket when the nights turn chilly on Bald Head Island.

A Bride Who Is Still a Lady in Waiting

A newlywed couple, Mr. and Mrs. Cloden, were honeymooning on Bald Head Island when a hurricane hit. They took shelter in one of the three lighthouse keepers' houses that had been left near the grounds of the second Cape Fear Light. Very few people lived on the island at the time, and the lighthouse keepers had left in the mid-1900s.

The young husband decided to take advantage of the break in the storm to find someone who could help them get off the island to the safety of the mainland. The groom told his bride, "Stay here and look out. I'll be back to get you."

And that's exactly what she has been doing for decades.

Even though her husband perished in the waters off Cape Fear and she died of starvation, Mrs. Cloden is said to have remained in one of the three houses now known as Capt. Charlie's Station. She stays on the second floor of the middle house so she can keep a look out for her husband, and she passes the time playing jacks and cards.

A number of people claim to have met Mrs. Cloden over the years, including the eight-year-old son of a carpenter who was making repairs at the house in the 1980s. The young boy told his father all about the red-haired lady who lives upstairs and played games with him during the day. When a family with a young son rented the house, that boy, too, talked about the very nice lady with bright red hair who met him at the top of the stairs every night. Furthermore, a couple who was honeymooning at the house reported seeing the bride's wedding gown moving on its hanger in the bedroom closet.

Mysterious Lights and a Mysterious Woman

Brooks Newton Preik grew up in Southport, N.C., a few houses down from Captain Charles "Charlie" Swan, the beloved keeper of the lights who faithfully served a number of lighthouses before retiring in 1933. Brooks and Charlie's son, Reese, grew up listening to the now legendary keeper's stories of heroic rescues, local history and, of course, Bald Head Island's enduring legends. Brooks recalls Reese saying that he had seen unexplained lights on the island many times... "not [marsh] gases either, just mysterious lights that had no business being there."

One man who built a white house in 1975 at the very west end of Bald Head Island's high dune ridge has also reported seeing mysterious brilliant lights—as well as a mysterious woman. When he and his wife moved into their new home, which they named Hilltop, there were no paved roads, no electricity and few permanent residents on the island. Several times his wife told him about seeing a blonde woman wearing a yellow-and-white striped blouse standing in the entrance hall of their home. Even though she and her husband were the only people on the island at the time, she said she didn't feel afraid because the woman was always smiling and appeared friendly.


He encountered the mysterious woman early one January morning in 1976 when he was staying alone at Hilltop. As he was walking down the road to catch a boat to the mainland, he noticed a strange light coming from behind him on this otherwise dark, moonless, predawn morning. Feeling very concerned, he looked


back and saw a brilliant show of lights illuminating the outside of his house. He said he didn't know whether to return to his house and forget his trip to the mainland or continue walking so he wouldn't miss the boat. Just as he decided to turn back toward the house, the faint figure of the blonde woman wearing the yellow-and-white striped blouse appeared before him and motioned for him to continue on his way to the boat.

He notes that to this day recalling that encounter makes the hair on the back of his neck stand up, and adds that a number of times over the years the same brilliant lights have illuminated the outside of their white house at the end of the high dune ridge.
















Simple Beauty, or Simply Beautiful?

To garden or not to garden—that is the enviable question for homeowners on Bald Head Island. I say "enviable" because not everyone wants to garden, especially when vacationing. Fortunately, adhering to strict landscaping requirements or even "keeping up with the Joneses" need not be an issue for islanders. While there are certain standards to be kept, minimal landscaping using native species is actually encouraged. As a result, the keep-it-simple approach is the most popular choice among island residents—and nothing could be more natural.

So exactly what is "natural" on this island? According to Bald Head Island's official guidelines, the island is divided into three zones: forest zone, scrub zone (close to, but not actually on the beach), and what is known as the pioneer zone along the beaches, where plants must be hardy enough to withstand the salt spray, sun and wind. With the landscape architect for Bald Head Island Limited as my guide, I recently took a tour of the island, visiting all three zones and taking a look at how some island homeowners have chosen to landscape their yards.



Gardening on Bald Head Island offers residents endless options to create their own natural oasis.

Mother Nature: The Master Gardener

As we deftly navigated the narrow roads in a golf cart, I learned a little of the island's history, especially with respect to the flora. Happily I was able to see for myself evidence of Bald Head Island's ecological history as enlightened development and management have left areas of land and shore just the way they have been for hundreds, maybe even thousands, of years.

A great example of this is the maritime forest, a protected area, where a variety of native plants remain completely undisturbed. Here you will see the sabal palm (Bald Head Island is thought to be the northernmost range for this palm growing in the wild), live oaks (some of them immense in size and age), wax myrtle, water oak, southern red oak, salt cedar and ferns, among other native species.

Step into this forest and it's like going back in time. In addition to those giant oaks towering over everything, the exotic looking palms, lush foliage and high-climbing vines give you the feeling of being in a tropical jungle—complete with the songs of brilliantly colored birds, including the elusive, rainbow-hued painted bunting. There is even a small swampy area in the maritime forest where you might see wetland plants like rushes and sedges. This is what much of the southern United States must have been like when the first explorers made their way here.

Dogwoods, with their delicate white springtime blossoms, at one time were plentiful on the island, but were depleted during the 20th century for their prized wood. This native tree is being reintroduced in gardens around the island, and is reappearing in the forest.

Beach areas and marshes present different, but equally beautiful, scenes of natural vegetation. Along the beaches, grasses such as sea oats and American beachgrass, and native wildflowers, like Blanket Flower (gaillardia), are prevalent and grow alongside shrubs and trees like eastern baccharas, red cedar and live oak. All of these plants flourish in sandy soil and are hardy enough to withstand the elements.

In the marsh areas around the island's creeks, you can see the expected—reeds,

swamp iris, cattails, wax myrtle and swamp mallow, among other plants. The colors of the marsh not only vary with the seasons, they change throughout the day, with the most beautiful pinks and golden hues occurring at sunrise and sunset.

The official Bald Head Island design guidelines explain the importance of conserving these zones and their interdependence: "Two major communities have been shaped by the natural forces working year after year—the open dunes and maritime live oak forest. The relative stability of the island has been dependent upon its maritime forest. The forest prevents wind erosion and traps wind-blown sand to eventually form the large dunes on the seaward edge."

The guidelines go on to explain the important role played by certain plant varieties affecting the stability of the slow-moving dunes: "The sea oats and other salt and wind-tolerant grasses and shrubs inhibit the movement that would otherwise bury the forest." Management of the island has even designated certain plants in need of special care and protection.

As Easy As 1, 2, 3

So just how do island homeowners go about landscaping their property? According to Donna Ray Mitchell, a landscape architect with more than 20 years of experience on the island, "Each home builder must submit a landscaping plan to the Architectural Review Board for approval before starting work. The plan must provide some kind of ground cover—in order to cover the disturbed areas of the property—as well as suitable plantings." The review board encourages the use of native plants in these plans, but some ornamentals are permitted when planted close to the house.

In response to the guidelines, residents seem to have embraced three basic landscaping options:

1. Less Is More

As mentioned above, the first of these is the "natural" look, using primarily native plants. With a minimum amount of trimming and tidying, this approach is entirely appropriate for a beach community and leaves homeowners free to enjoy the island without worrying about the garden.

Leaving things natural is probably the simplest and certainly one of the most conventional options, especially in the beach and scrub zones of the island. Many homeowners not only like the way it fits in with the natural environment, they love not having to spend time mowing, pruning, deadheading, fertilizing and watering. All this type of landscaping requires is the occasional trimming of nearby bushes and maybe a little weeding, especially around paths and driveways. Turf is not even allowed on the island, except for the golf course and certain public areas, which helps to preserve the intrinsic qualities of the island.

However, one of the few decorative elements to be found in these natural landscapes is driftwood. No two pieces are alike and their sculptural form can be the perfect focal point for a simple island landscape plan.

2. Colorful Personalities

A second approach is to add touches of color, but very little additional maintenance, using containers or small raised beds for flowers and foliage plants. This seems to be a widespread compromise with island homeowners.

The containers themselves may be brightly colored (like Asian pots made of a glazed ceramic), or basic and unadorned, but filled to the brim with a dazzling display of annuals. Small raised beds close to the house may showcase flowers, herbs or perhaps an ornamental shrub and perennials.

Container gardening can be found in all zones of the island, but is especially prevalent within the picket-fenced yards of Harbour Village.

3. Deep-Rooted Passion

Thirdly, those who love gardens and gardening have found a way to include that hobby with carefully constructed gardens that work with the environment or that have been designed to create their own micro-climate.

Only those passionate about gardens appear to have chosen this third option. In addition to the sandy soil and abundant sun, salt spray and wind, "Plants on Bald Head Island grow faster than you would anticipate, and there is constant invasion from woody plants and vines—especially in the forest areas," said Donna. "In the dune areas you are struggling with lack of moisture and finding things that will be successful despite the constant wind and heat."

In spite of the challenges, there are some wonderful examples of where passion and persistence have paid off—usually with professional input from local landscape architects or designers.


























Flower Power, Bald Head Island Style

For Bald Head Island homeowners who aspire to a flower garden or want to know what to plant in containers, here is a sampling of flowering plants I saw on my tour of the island, all of which seemed to be doing well. Some need protection, and in the case of beachfront property, placing them on the landward side of the home is advisable. Windbreaks, such as a fence, hedge or shade trees, may also do the trick.

Vines: Trumpet Honeysuckle, Confederate Jasmine, Morning Glory, Trumpet Creeper, Carolina Jessamine. and Passion Flower.

Shrubs: Oleander, Gardenia, Barberry, Loropetalum, Rosemary, Lady Banks and Texas Sage (Leucophyllum).

Perennials: Society Garlic, Verbena,
Gaillardia, Buddleia, Coreopsis, Aster,
Gaura, Ox-eyed Daisy, Goldenrod, Monarda,
Black Eyed Susie (Rudbeckia), Cone Flower
(Echinacea) and certain "wild" species of Phlox

Annuals: Lantana, Marigolds, Penta, Tropical Hibiscus, Wave Petunias, Begonias, Zinnias and Celosia; all are excellent choices for pots or raised beds

Grasses: This is a very successful group of plants for climatic conditions like those found on Bald Head Island, and among those thriving there are: Fountain Grass, Miscanthus, striped Zebra grass and the rather invasive Blue Dune Grass (Leymus arenarius).

A Mini Island Garden Tour

One of my favorite gardens on the island has taken advantage of a shallow hollow at the end of a driveway on Brown Pelican Trail that slopes down to the front door on the landward side of the oceanfront house. With this approach, the homeowners have created at least three micro-climates in one landscape.

To the right of the driveway, heat- and drought-tolerant plants such as zebra grass, Mexican bush sage, artemesia and verbena adorn and stabilize the slope down to the hollow. In the hollow itself, semi-tropicals like crotons and tropical hibiscus are flourishing. On the left, shade trees provide a suitable environment for hosta, holly ferns and impatiens. Window boxes full of flowers decorate a bridge over the driveway and complete the picture-perfect scene.

Nearby, the driveway to the beachfront home of Flora and Eugene Johnson, Jr. on Coquina Trail slopes up toward the entrance. On either side, Flora and landscape designer Rob Prescott have experimented with several species of plants until they arrived at the current selection, which includes trees, shrubs, perennials and a smattering of annuals—all of them known for their tolerance of the conditions. Sabal palmettos form a backdrop to smaller palms, and shrubs, like the beautiful butterfly-attracting buddleia, share space with flowering perennials, including a large grouping of society garlic, lantana, rosemary, yarrow, oleander and ornamental grasses. All add color and texture to the sloping landscape.

Flora, who says she is not a gardener, explained why she felt strongly about landscaping her property. "I wanted it to look nice," she said. "It's my home even though it's on the rental market, and I wanted it to be a 'home' for anybody who stayed here."

Over in the maritime forest area, I came across a small garden with a white fence behind which a group of fragrant roses was enjoying the sunlight filtering through the trees. At another home, clumps of red monarda were

hosting swallowtail butterflies. While in another yard, fenced and with an attractive arbor, differing shades of red manifested in barberry, crocosmia and salvia, stood out against the soft greens of miscanthus plumes.

Gardening on Bald Head Island has numerous challenges, to be sure. But at the end of my tour I found myself agreeing with my landscape architect guide, who said, "The island is about refuge, relaxation and renewal." The trick to achieving those is in finding just the right mix of nature and nurture, which together can create a beautiful, simple landscape that is simply a joy to behold.





Same As It Ever Was, Yet Dramatically Different Every Day

{The Bald Head Island Club Golf Course}

as the Bald Head Island Club raises the profile of its Even 18-hole championship golf course and the unique golfing experience it offers, the club looks back to renowned course designer George Cobb's original vision. What Cobb had in mind when he built the course in 1972 may be even clearer today than it was then.

In those 30-odd years since the course was built, it has melded with the natural environment so thoroughly that it belongs on Bald Head Island as easily and naturally as the maritime forests, sand dunes, beaches and gnarled live oaks that comprise North Carolina's southernmost cape island; it is a place of unusual beauty, character, charm and history.


Not many people are aware that long before Cobb became the lead design consultant at Augusta National and a world-class designer of more than 100 golf courses, he was a U.S. Marine Engineer during World War II. He designed his first golf course, built as a physical rehabilitation facility for wounded marines, at Camp Lejeune, N.C.

"It was likely at that moment that Cobb developed his design philosophy that golf was supposed to heal and to stimulate, not to punish," Joe Passov, an editor at Golf Magazine, said recently about that first Cobb design. Many of those who play the Bald Head Island course today would likely agree with this assessment.

Playing A Round With Mother Nature

It doesn't take much imagination to conjure what Cobb saw when he first visited this 12,000-acre island and began designing his course. He encountered the most temperate place in North Carolina, an island at the end of the Cape Fear River that contains an amazing variety of ecosystems; miles of ocean beaches that years later would be recognized as among the finest on the East Coast; a spectacular dune ridge that threads its way along the island's interior; a rare and lush maritime forest with live oaks, dogwoods, sabal palms, cedars, yaupons and junipers. Many of those live oaks are huge, centuriesold edifices with craggy, weatherworn faces and limbs that sag as if reaching back tiredly toward the sandy soil. The variety of foliage on this semi-tropical island is stunning.

Surely, Cobb was aware of the abundant wildlife that thrived on the island when he first began sketching the tees, fairways and greens, and deftly fitting the course into the existing terrain. He must have seen great herons, egrets, ibises, foxes, and even alligators. Fill used to shape fairways became the freshwater lagoons that distinguish the course today and look as natural on the island as the nearby salt marshes that have been drawing fishermen to the island for centuries. Alligators now wallow lazily along those lagoons, drawn to the serenity. An osprey, one of the largest birds of prey in North America, nests in a dead oak near the tees of the seventh hole. Like the links courses of Ireland and Scotland, Cobb

From the member tee golfers should hit the ball as far as they possibly can. Use a driver because the hole measures 477 yards. Long hitters might take the ball over the corner of the trees on the left hand side of the fairway. However, most players will want to hit the ball right down the middle of the fairway. On the second shot, if a player is laying up to the hole, lay up to the right hand side of the fairway. There is an overhanging oak that will come into play, so golfers will need to play it loose.

This is a great hole and very challenging. It has been opened up a little on the right hand side, so players can use a short iron to a wedge on their third shot to the green. While par is a good score here, birdies are plentiful. It is a very large green.

conceived seven holes that reach across rolling dunes overlooking the ocean.


But don't be fooled. The Bald Head Island Club course may be set in a serene and natural environment, but it is a challenging course for even the best golfers. Cobb may have left much of the terrain the way he found it, but he knew how to make golfers stretch their skills. Awarded a coveted 4.5 stars from Golf Digest's "Places to Play," the 6,855-yard course has a slope rating of 139 and a course rating of 74.3. This means it is among the top 20 percent of courses in the country in terms of difficulty. But even that's not the entire story. You don't need to be an expert golfer to play the course. You need only to be willing to challenge yourself.

Making Shots, Making Memories

The club's golf pro, Ron Thomason, a Professional Golfers' Association of America (PGA) member since 1995, says he's delighted by the increased profile of the course.

"People realize we're here now. Word is getting around," says Ron. "We're doing a good deal more package play than in the past and many more golfers are coming out here for the day and returning to the mainland in the evening," Ron continues.

Ron, 36, grew up in Marion, Va., and learned how to play golf there as a child. He led his high school team to an AA state championship and is a graduate of Methodist College in Fayetteville, N.C., where in 1992 he earned a degree in business administration and golf management. He came to the Bald Head Island Club as Director of Golf in February 2005 after a stint at Linville Ridge, a private club in the Blue Ridge Mountains in western North Carolina, also designed by George Cobb. Ron has a good deal of experience working with and playing courses designed by the legendary designer, who died in 1986.

Hole Eight [par 3]

This is a very good short hole. From the member tee it measures 147 yards. The wind is usually blowing on players here from left to right. The tee lines players up to the right side of the hole, so they really need to concentrate on getting themselves to the left of the hole. The green is small. Water comes into play, but more than anything else the bunker on the right hand side comes into play because of the wind and how the tee lines players up.

On a normal day with the wind, I'd probably hit an eight or seven iron. I might normally hit a 150-yard shot with an eight iron, but with the wind, I'll use a seven iron, or even a six, and play a low punch shot toward the middle of the green. Try not to go for the pin. Par is a good score here on a normal day.



From the member tee it's about 412 yards. This is probably the most difficult hole on the front side, and it may be one of the best holes of golf on the course. There's water on the left and the right off the tee. If the wind is against players, which is normally the case, they can hit as far as they want on their first, still leaving a lengthy approach to the green. This is a very long hole, especially into the wind. They can hit a driver or a fairway wood, depending on length, to a mid to long iron for their second shots over water to the green.

The second shot here is one of our longest on the course. The green is big. Players will want to shoot for the middle of it. This is a very difficult hole, especially if the wind is against you. If players hit the ball just a little off line, they'll wind up in the water on either side. Par is a great score here. There is a premium on driving accuracy on this hole.

"I don't think over the years that there have been very many design changes to this course. There might have been a couple of changes to the greens here and there, but for the most part members want to keep the characteristics of the course the way Cobb designed and perceived them," Ron says. "We completed a \$1.5 million irrigation system on the course in 2005 that has helped out tremendously by eliminating salt water that seeped into the previous irrigation system."

Describing the course, Ron explains, "The greens are large, just like with any George Cobb design. There's a lot of water—in fact there are 15 freshwater lagoons along the course—which is a challenge, but the course is playable by any group because it isn't too long. It measures about 6,800 yards from the very back tees, but most of our members play it from 6,200 yards. We also have gold tees that are at 5,800 yards."

Ron describes the fairways as "generous and wider than you might expect," and despite the fact that there are few sand traps, if you're not hitting straight, it's not as though you'll only hit the ball into woods, where it might still be playable. Here you're more likely to hit the ball into water, where it will be lost, and you'll be forced to take a penalty stroke.

"After I first play a course," Ron says, "I look at it and ask myself how many holes I can remember, you know, how many are distinctive. This is one of those few golf courses where you



From the member tee the hole is about 463 yards, dogleg left. Long hitters can hit it out there, but they need to keep the ball to the left hand side. If they hit it to the right, they're going to wind up in the woods. It's closer through the fairway on the right side than most golfers realize. Long hitters have to take the ball over the palms on the left. Average players need to hit the ball right into the heart of the fairway. Off the tee, a distance of 200 yards with a fairway wood or an iron is all that is needed. A lay up short of the water guarding the green on the second shot is generally required. Water also runs along the left side of the fairway.

The green is probably the narrowest on the course from front to back. It can get a little firm, so there is a premium on wedge play for the third shot. This is very reachable in two for long hitters, but it is a very challenging hole. It makes you think, because even if you go for it, you can really run into problems on the left hand side.



From the member tee the hole is about 381 yards. Play off the tee is premium. Even if players are long shooters, they'll want to leave the ball about 150 yards out for the second shot. The reason is that there is a slight dogleg right. There are trees on the right hand side and water on the left. From about 150 yards out the fairway slopes right to left, so if players hit to the right the ball will have a good chance of rolling into the water. So, players are better off hitting no longer than 250 yards off the tee, no matter their length.

You have to have patience with this hole. If you are trying to make up for a bad hole with a birdie, this is not the hole to do it. The fairway gets narrow leading up to the green, and this too can be a problem. This is one of my favorite holes because of its playability. It requires you to think and plan. You just can't get up and swing at the ball.



Hole Fourteen {par 4}

From the member tee the hole is about 397 yards. This is probably our best par 4. Players normally play this hole into the wind. There is a premium here on driving accuracy. There's a dogleg right with water along the left side and a slope from right to left. A driver can find the water, but laying up leaves a long approach onto an elevated green. It plays here a little bit longer than normal. Try to play for the middle of the fairway. This hole does play a club longer and it normally plays right into the wind.

This is a very good par four with a small green for the length of the hole. This is one of those holes where you can hit a low shot and let it run. As long as you hit it before you get to the bank, it should roll up.



Hole Fifteen { par 4}

From the member tee the hole is about 345 yards, but it will actually play a little longer than this. There's water all the way up the left hand side and trees on the right. There's a branch of water that comes right out about 80 yards before the green. You can hit a driver here. You're going to have to use a mid to short iron to the green. When it comes to aesthetics, this hole has a lot of character. Average golfers can hit here as long as they want, but they'll want to keep the ball in the middle of the fairway.

will remember a lot of holes. It's what attracts so many people to this course and brings them back again. The holes don't run parallel. There are only a couple of holes out here that run up against each other.

"Except for those holes, you won't know there's anybody else on the course, unless you see a group behind you or in front of you. This is rare on a modern golf course. We may have more than 100 players out there at any time, and you might not see any of them. Golfers like this because it gives them a chance to feel at peace while they play. This peace helps them to concentrate and, as a result, it probably helps most of them to play a better game with more enjoyment," Ron says.

One of the biggest challenges at Bald Head Island is not its length nor even the lagoons, but rather the winds.

The (Ever-Present) Winds of Change

Dave Shadday, a Bald Head Island Club member who lives in Indigo Plantation in Southport, N.C., has been playing the course two or three times a week for nearly 20 years. "The wind is a big factor," Dave says. "You'll very seldom play the course on a calm day. The wind adds an element to playing that I really like. It keeps it cool and changes everything. It's one of the reasons you can never get bored playing at Bald Head Island."

Another player, Harry Aylor, also a club member who lives in Southport, says he has "probably played the course more than any other human being."

"The wind blows 360 days a year," Harry explains. "There are two different kinds of winds generally. There are the winterspring winds and the summer-fall winds. They come from different directions. We get nor easters in the winter and spring, and we get southeasters or southwesters in the summer and fall. So one time you end up playing into the wind and the next time you're playing downwind, and this causes difficulties."

"People come out here and they play in the wind and say this is a unique round of golf," Ron says. "It is unique. That's what you're getting out here, especially if you're coming for the day. You take the ferry from the mainland and catch a cart ride here, since there are no cars on the island. You're not being hustled about. You're not in a hurry. There are a lot of people who say this is a very challenging golf course, but it is also a very fair golf course. If you hit the ball well, you can shoot a good score. You can make birdies on par fives. They're not too long to do this. Yet, you can get in trouble with them. You can be aggressive and make the low score, or you can be aggressive and make a high score. It's very fair in that regard. There's nothing hidden."

Shane Sharp, a contributing writer with Golf Publisher Syndications, passed along a story about PGA Tour veteran Brad Faxon and Bald Head Island in an article several years ago. Faxon had played the low score on the course, an amazing 65, a record that still holds:

"...Brad Faxon, master of the flat stick, must have been carving all kinds of nasty wind cheaters when he set the course record with a tasty 65 from the 6,855-back tees. Fax parred 16 from the then 195-

yard tips (into a 20 knot wind most days), and took birdie on the 460-yard 18th (uphill, water on both sides and into the wind); scores that certainly hammer home the Tour's mantra that 'these guys are good."

But, Ron adds: "The next day Brad Faxon comes back out to the course and shoots an 81 or 82. The wind had changed."

Parting Shots: Playing the Course

Ron has become an expert on the course through both play and study. For this article he agreed to describe how best to shoot some of its more challenging and interesting holes. Generally, he describes how a so-called average golfer, playing from the mid- or member tees might play the hole, but being a long hitter himself, he provides a PGA professional's perspective and some insights into the course that most Bald Head Island golfers might want to keep handy (see shaded boxes).

Hole Sixteen {par 3}

From the member tee the hole is about 187 yards. Many refer to this beautiful hole, with a view of the ocean in the distance, as the course's "signature hole." When the wind picks up you can feel it here. It is usually blowing against you left to right. On some days golfers might hit a mid iron but usually they're better off with a long iron to a fairway wood to the green. Three is a great score here. On really windy days, I recommend laying up before the water.

With the wind, you'll want to aim for the left part of the green because it is a little closer than the right side. The ball will normally drift to the right in the wind. I try to play this in the middle of the green.



From Yes to Do Getting Married on Bald Head Island


In a sort of exchange that reminds me of the old "Green Acres" theme song, we both excitedly described what we loved about the island as we planned the birthday getaway.

Reservations made fewer than 30 days in advance require payment in full at time of booking. Deposits are held in an interest-bearing account with accrued interest payable to Bald Head Island Limited. Accepted methods of payment include MasterCard, Visa, American Express, Discover, traveler's cheques, personal check or cash. All checks must be issued in U.S. funds and drawn on a bank that operates within the U.S. Federal Reserve System. A \$35 fee will be assessed on all returned checks.

Security Deposit

A credit card number is needed to book reservations. Guests are responsible for any damages, other than normal wear and tear, that occur to accommodations, electric vehicles or household furnishings as a result of their occupancy. Bald Head Island Limited reserves the right to charge the renter's credit card for any damages found, as permitted under N.C. Statute.

Cancellations and Refunds

A 45-day cancellation policy is in effect. The party in whose name the reservation is made must make cancellations. If your reservation is canceled 45 or more days in advance of your arrival date, 90% of any monies paid will be refunded. If reservation is canceled fewer than 45 days in advance of your arrival date, no refunds will be made unless the accommodations unit is re-rented. If the unit is re-rented at the same rate, 90% of any monies paid will be refunded. If the unit is re-rented at a discount rate, the difference will be applied to your refund. Subject to availability, reservations may be rescheduled one time only for a later arrival date if notice is given 30 days or more in advance of originally scheduled arrival date. Any deposits or prepayments may be applied to the rescheduled reservation, and all other reservation requirements are applicable. No refund or rate adjustment will be made for malfunction of air conditioners, TV, appliances or construction noise. Repairs will be made as soon as possible after notification, or other comparable accommodations will be provided, depending upon availability.

Taxes

Your account balance will include a 1/2% Brunswick County tax, a 6% Village of Bald Head Island accommodations tax and 6.25% N.C. sales tax. Any changes in current tax rates will be applied on the effective date.

Check-in and Check-out Times

Our guest check-in and reception area is located at the Indigo Plantation & Marina ferry landing in Southport. Ferry tickets, property keys, temporary membership cards to the BHI and Shoals Clubs along with a welcome packet can be collected from the Front Desk inside the terminal building at the appropriate check-in time.

Check-in and check-out times vary according to each accommodation (3 p.m./10:30 a.m.; 4 p.m./11:30 a.m.; 5 p.m./12:30 p.m., check-out day depending). Ferry reservation times will be indicated on the guest's Rental Confirmation. Arrival and departure ferry reservations will be made by a reservationist for times that closely match assigned check-in and check-out times, based on ferry and tram availability. The check-in time listed on the Rental Confirmation indicates ferry departure from Indigo Plantation & Marina. The check-out time listed on the Rental Confirmation indicates ferry departure from the island. Guests should arrive at Indigo Plantation & Marina at least 30 minutes prior to scheduled check-in time to allow time for the check-in process, parking, and any security processing.

Please note that ferries depart Indigo on the hour and depart the island on the half hour unless otherwise noted. No provisions are made for early arrival or late departure. Failure to check-out from accommodations on time will result in an additional half-day rental fee.

Ferry Reservations

Passengers will be sold tickets in two parts; one ticket will be used for each leg of the round trip to and from the island. Those attempting to depart the island that do not have their ticket must buy another ticket at the lost ticket fare. Tickets are absolutely required for hoarding the ferry.

boarding the ferry.

Regularly scheduled trips to the island are made every hour on the hour starting at 6 a.m. and continuing through the evening. Trips to the mainland are made every hour on the half hour from 6:30 a.m. through the evening. Tram service begins at 8 a.m. There are two schedules, one during the winter, another during the remainder of the year. Additional supplemental ferries may run during the peak summer season. Details of the schedules are available by calling 910-457-5003, by logging onto our Web site at baldheadisland.com, by viewing posted schedules at the ferry terminals and on page 173 in this publication.

Small gas-powered vehicles with passenger trams are used to transport arriving passengers and their luggage from the island ferry terminal to their accommodations and from their accommodations to the island ferry terminal when they depart. Guests are required to make ferry and tram reservations that coordinate with their check-in/check-out times when booking their accommodations. Ferry arrival and departure reservations for Bald Head Island Limited guests will be booked simultaneously with their accommodation reservation to ensure tram availability and to synchronize with check-in and check-out times.

Guests may call their reservationist to make any necessary changes to ferry reservations to the island and from the island. Guests should have their ferry reservation confirmation number available when changing ferry reservations. Transportation personnel will not be able to change arrival reservations pre-booked by a reservationist. Pre-booked reservations will be made to coincide with your accommodation check-in and check-out times.

Visitors should plan to arrive at least 30 minutes before their scheduled ferry departure time and drive directly to the baggage area. This procedure allows the time necessary for dock staff to assist in unloading baggage from cars and loading it onto the ferry baggage dollies. During the 2007 season, security procedures may be implemented that have the potential to lengthen processing time. Guests who arrive near the time of scheduled ferry departure risk missing the ferry and subsequent island appointments. Upon departure, make sure all luggage is placed at the end of the driveway at least 30 minutes prior to ferry departure time. Please note, neither smoking nor the consumption of alcoholic beverages is permitted on any BHI ferry or tram

How to Pack

Bald Head Island's baggage handling system is similar to that of an airline, so guests should pack as if they were flying to their destination, and exercise restraint in what they choose to bring. When guests arrive at the Indigo ferry terminal, they should place their luggage on the baggage racks and make sure an outfitter is aware of their luggage. Nametags are required on all luggage and boxes, and are available at the ferry landing. Please limit luggage to no more than three checked pieces and two carry-on pieces per person. Loose items such as opentop bags or boxes, grocery bags, Styrofoam coolers, jackets, shoes, tennis rackets, surfboards or fragile items such as video cameras must be hand-carried. Such luggage may be subject to security screening. Please remember that a crib and high chair are provided in each rental unit. Other items such as beach chairs, beach umbrellas, boogie boards and bicycles may be rented on the island. Call Island Passage at (910) 457-4944 for more information.

Large, bulky items such as bicycles will require a Special Cargo Ticket that can be purchased for an additional fee when guests arrive. These special cargo items will not be transported in trams due to size, sharp edges and grease. Cargo space on the ferries is limited; therefore, it is possible cargo items will not be transported along with passengers. Every effort will be made to transport cargo within six hours of guest's ferry time. These items may be claimed at the island ferry depot and transported using a golf cart provided with the accommodations. Special cargo departing the island should be brought to the island ferry depot the day prior to the guest's departure, where it will be transported to the mainland for timely pick-up by the guest. Technologically advanced expensive bicycles are not recommended on the ferry system as they can become damaged in transit. Please note: Bald Head Island Limited accepts no liability for road bicycles damaged in transit.

Furnishings and Equipment

All rental accommodations have fully equipped kitchens, washers and dryers, vacuum cleaners, color TV, central heat and air conditioning, telephones, cribs (generally Pack & Plays), high chairs, bath towels and bed linens. Linens for cribs and sleeper sofas must be requested when reservation is made. Each unit has one or more electric golf cart(s). Complimentary initial supplies of cleaning products, paper towels, bath tissue and soap are provided at check-in. Additional

supplies can be purchased at the Maritime Market. Locked closets are maintained by homeowners for personal use. Please respect these areas.

Housekeeping

Accommodations are thoroughly cleaned before each guest's arrival. Additional housekeeping services can be requested at a special rate based on availability.

Accommodations Capacity

The number in your party should not exceed the maximum occupancy as stated under each listing. Private functions/parties are not allowed in rental accommodations without prior approval.

Attire

Although the BHI clubhouse is a casual facility, a dress code is in effect. "Smart casual" attire is appropriate. Collared shirts are required in the clubhouse as well as on the golf course. Golfers are required to wear soft spikes on their golf shoes and are permitted only in designated areas. (Replacement spikes are available for purchase at the Pro Shop.) Appropriate footwear is required in the clubhouse, on the tennis courts, and in the fitness center. "Cut off" shorts are not permitted in the clubhouse. The club discourages denim jeans during dinner. The clubhouse offers a smoke-free and cell phone-free environment. All other facilities, including the Shoals Club. are casual.

Telephone

Long distance calls from rental accommodations phones must be made collect or by credit card or calling card.

Pets

Pets are allowed only in rental accommodations designated petfriendly. No pets are allowed in rental accommodations not listed as pet friendly, except for service pets. We reserve the right to terminate any rental, without refund, if pets are found on the premises, and charge an additional \$500 to treat the property for fleas. Pet-friendly accommodations require a non-refundable fee of \$200 plus tax. Pets are not allowed inside the passenger cabin of any BHI ferry.

Safety

The Village of Bald Head Island is an incorporated municipality, and ordinances are in place which are intended to protect the island and its inhabitants. Information about Village ordinances pertinent to your visit and activities can be found in the in-room directory provided in each rental accommodation or by contacting the Village at (910) 457-9700. PLEASE NOTE: Grilling is restricted on wooden decks, patios, and under houses. Propane gas grills are generally permitted, but some communities restrict grilling entirely. Please check with your reservationist for further information about grilling. PLEASE ALSO NOTE: Electric golf carts are not toys, and their misuse can lead to serious adverse consequences. They are subject to all laws and ordinances applicable to operation of a motor vehicle on a public road, including the requirement that operators must possess a valid driver's license, be at least 16 years old, and not under the influence of alcohol or drugs. Be sure to read and follow all instructions provided in the vehicle and the in-room directory for golf cart operation, including the precautions suggested for the safety of drivers and passengers. Whether biking, hiking, swimming or riding, please take care and make this a safe vacation trip for you and your family on Bald Head Island.

Construction

Unfortunately, we cannot predict the location of construction activity on the island and may not be able to inform you at the time you make your reservation whether your accommodations are near a construction site. We will not make refunds because of construction activity.

Severe Weather

If hurricanes or other extreme weather conditions occur, the Village of Bald Head Island may issue a voluntary or mandatory evacuation notice. In either event, the lodging portion of accommodations charges will be prorated from the time of departure from the island until the island is reopened, or until the end of your reservation period, whichever comes first. Ferry tickets back to the island will be charged at full rate. If no evacuation notice is issued, and you choose to leave the island before the end of your reservation period, no refunds will be made.

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OVERVIEW

THE ISLAND COMMUNITY

Bald Head Island is a boat-accessed residential and resort island community with 14 miles of beaches, rolling dunes, freshwater lagoons, a nearly 200-acre maritime forest preserve and approximately 2,000 developed acres. Approximately 10,000 acres of salt marsh and tidal creeks bordering the island to the north have been deeded to the State of North Carolina to be left undeveloped. Preservation of the island's natural, historical and cultural heritage is an ongoing commitment of the developer and is the basis for several programs jointly sponsored with property owners.

Transportation to the island is by passenger ferry or private yacht, and island transportation for property owners and guests is by tram, golf cart, bicycle or foot.

DEVELOPER

Bald Head Island Limited, a company owned by the George P. Mitchell family, purchased the undeveloped portions of the island in 1983 and oversees the island's development. Bald Head Island Limited manages real estate development and sales, island operations, restaurants and an on-island property management program.

LOCATION

GETTING HERE BY LAND, AIR OR SEA

Bald Head Island is located two nautical miles off of North Carolina's coast at the mouth of the Cape Fear River. The island is a 20-minute passenger ferry ride from the mainland embarkation





point located at Indigo Plantation and Marina in the historic waterfront town of Southport, N.C. Wilmington, N.C., is 30 miles north of Southport, and Myrtle Beach, S.C., is 60 miles south.

BY LAND

Locating Bald Head Island's Ferry Terminal

Please be aware that there are two ferry terminals in Southport: the N.C. State ferry to Fort Fisher on Ferry Road off East Moore Street and the Bald Head Island Ferry Landing at Indigo Plantation and Marina off West 9th Street on Indigo Plantation Drive in Southport.

For automobile travelers, Interstate 40 and N.C. State Highway 74/76 link the region directly with Interstate 95 and US 17, providing access from points north, south and west. Entering Southport on Route 211 South (Howe Street), turn right onto West 9th Street and follow this road to Indigo Plantation (1.7 miles). Indigo Plantation Drive ends at the ferry terminal. A reception area, restrooms and the ticket office are located at the ferry terminal adjacent to the marina.

Arriving at the Ferry Terminal - Visitors should plan to arrive at least 30 minutes before their scheduled ferry departure time and drive directly to the baggage area. This procedure allows the time necessary for dock staff to assist in unloading baggage from cars and loading it onto the

ferry baggage dollies. Visitors also have time to purchase their ferry tickets at the ticket window. Bald Head Island ferries run on a set schedule, leaving the mainland on the hour and leaving the island on the half-hour. It's about a 20-minute trip in each direction. NOTICE: During the 2007 season, security procedures may be implemented that have the potential to lengthen processing time. Guests who arrive near the time of scheduled ferry departure risk missing the ferry and subsequent island appointments.

Parking - Daily fees are charged for parking in designated car lots B, C and D. When entering through the electronic gate, visitors receive a dated ticket. You must keep this ticket until you leave the island, and then present it at the B Lot Parking Booth after disembarking at the Indigo Plantation Ferry Landing. Following payment, visitors receive their parking ticket back with an exit code on a magnetic strip.

Ferry and Tram Reservations - Advance reservations are required for the ferry and should be confirmed at least three days in advance of travel by calling 910-457-5003.

Passengers will be sold tickets in two parts; one ticket will be used for each leg of the round trip to and from the island. Those attempting to depart the island that do not have their ticket must

buy another ticket at the lost ticket fare. Tickets are absolutely required for boarding the ferry.

Regularly scheduled trips to the island are made every hour on the hour starting at 6 a.m. and continuing through the evening. Trips to the mainland are made every hour on the half hour from 6:30 a.m. through the evening. Tram service begins at 8 a.m. There are two schedules, one during the winter, another during the remainder of the year. Additional supplemental ferries may run during the peak summer season. Details of the schedules are available by calling 910-457-5003, by logging onto our Web site at baldheadisland.com, by viewing posted schedules at the ferry terminals and on page 173 in this publication.

Small gas-powered vehicles with passenger trams are used to transport arriving passengers and their luggage from the island ferry terminal to their accommodations and from their accommodations to the island ferry terminal when they depart. Guests are required to make ferry and tram reservations that coordinate with their check-in/check-out times when booking their accommodations. Ferry arrival and departure reservations for Bald Head Island Limited guests will be booked simultaneously to their accommodation reservation to ensure tram availability and to synchronize with check-in and check-out times.

A "no-frills" ticket is available at the island ferry terminal window only for same-day round-trips that originate on the island, and require no baggage handling or tram service.

BY AIR

Wilmington International Airport (ILM) in Wilmington, N.C., is just 35 miles north, and the Myrtle Beach Jetport (MYR) in Myrtle Beach, S.C., is 60 miles south. Please consult air carriers for service, rates and schedules.

Directions from Airports - From the Wilmington air terminal, take a left onto 23rd Street and follow to first traffic light. Make a right, following signs to US 74 West to US 17. Follow signs to Whiteville (74 West / 133 South) and cross over the Luther Jordan, Jr. Bridge. Continue, following signs to US 17 crossing the N.E. Cape Fear (Holmes) Bridge. After the bridge, make a left and follow signs for Brunswick County Beaches. Continue on US 17 South, following the signs for Myrtle Beach; stay on US 17 approximately 10 miles to the junction of NC 87 South; take a left onto NC 87 to Southport. In Southport turn left at the traffic light on Howe Street (NC 211). Continue to the next traffic light at the intersection of West 9th Street. Take a right turn onto West 9th Street and continue until it ends at the entrance to Indigo Plantation and Marina. Follow signs on Indigo Plantation Drive to the ferry terminal.

From the Myrtle Beach Jetport terminal, take US 17 North to the junction of NC 211. Turn right (east) and continue straight into Southport to West 9th Street. Take a right turn onto West 9th Street and continue until it ends at the entrance to Indigo Plantation and Marina. Follow signs on Indigo Plantation Drive to the ferry terminal.

From I-40, take exit #416A for Myrtle Beach, then follow signs to US 17 South and Southport as directed above.

Brunswick County Airport is a public airport located in the Southport area, just 15 minutes from the ferry terminal. The hard-surface landing field is 4,000 feet long, with landing lights that can be keyed by the pilot. Car rental, fuel, maintenance and repairs are available. Call 910-457-6483.

BY SEA

Bald Head Island Marina, near green buoy #13A at the mouth of the Cape Fear River, is accessible by boat from the Intracoastal Waterway, Cape Fear River or Atlantic Ocean. The Indigo Plantation Marina is near Intracoastal Waterway mile marker #310 just west of Southport.

Arriving by Private Yacht - For those who cruise to our shores, Bald Head Island Marina is a 10-acre harbour offering slips from 30 to 100 feet in length. With floating docks and standard amenities, the harbour comfortably accommodates large and small pleasure craft and cruisers. Monthly and daily slip rates are available.

Water and electrical hookups are available with most slips. Many slips have cable television hookups. Gas and diesel fuel, showers, rest rooms, laundry facilities and a pump-out station are provided for convenience. Two restaurants and a convenience store are also located beside the harbour. A full-service supermarket is centrally located on Maritime Way, near the corner of Muscadine Wynd and Federal Road.

For more information, call the dockmaster on VHF channel 16 or by phone at 910-457-7380. Boaters trailering their own craft may launch them from the Southport Marina and store their trailers for a fee in the lot provided there. Trailers may not be stored at any Indigo Plantation parking lots.

ISLAND GUESTS

HOW TO PACK

Guests should pack as if traveling by plane, even if driving. Since guests' travel to the island is by ferry and transfer is made to a small tram, a limited amount of baggage is recommended. When guests arrive at Bald Head Island's mainland ferry terminal, their bags are placed in luggage dollies and loaded aboard a passenger ferry. Nametags

are required on all luggage and boxes, and are available at the ferry landing. Luggage should be limited to no more than three checked pieces and two carry-on pieces per person. Loose items such as jackets, shoes, tennis rackets and fragile items such as video cameras or golf bags without covers must be hand carried. Open-top bags, boxes, grocery bags and coolers cannot be transported in dollies. These items must be hand carried aboard the ferry. Anything that cannot be considered checked luggage at an airport may be considered carry-on luggage by Bald Head Island's transportation system.

PETS

No pets are allowed in any Bald Head Island Limited rental accommodations except for service pets, such as guide dogs, or in accommodations designated pet-friendly. An additional fee may be charged for accommodations that allow pets. Pets are not allowed inside the ferry passenger cabin.

SPECIAL CARGO

Passengers must purchase special cargo tickets for large, bulky items such as bicycles, which require special handling. Larger items such as windsurfing boards may require more than one special cargo ticket, depending upon size. Surfboards do not require a special cargo ticket, but must be hand carried aboard the ferry. Due to sharp edges, greasy parts and cumbersome size, bicycles, windsurfing boards and other such items may not be loaded on the trams that carry passengers and luggage to their accommodations. These items will be stored at the island ferry depot for guests to retrieve later with their accommodations' golf cart. Due to limited cargo space on the ferries, we will make every effort to transport special cargo items within six hours of guest's ferry time. Make sure special cargo items are brought to the island terminal sufficiently in advance to ensure their timely loading for departure.

IDENTIFICATION TAGS

We request that guests put their names on all luggage and boxes. Luggage tags are available at the mainland ferry depot.



ARRIVING ON THE ISLAND

When guests with tram reservations disembark the passenger ferry at the island ferry terminal, they should go to the baggage claim area to collect their baggage. Outfitters will assist in loading baggage onto guests' assigned trams. Guests are asked to keep an inventory and make sure all their belongings are loaded. Items left at the island ferry terminal will be held for the guest to claim to the best of our ability. The security of these items is not quaranteed.

ELECTRIC CARTS

Bald Head Island Limited rental units are provided with at least one four-passenger electric cart that is located at the rental home. There are no gears, only forward and reverse. Carts should be recharged after each use. Recharging for at least six hours during each day of stay is recommended.

Bald Head Island Limited resort guests who have a problem with their electric carts should call Guest Services at 910-457-7440. Guests who wish to rent an additional cart should call Island Passage at 910-457-4944.

By law, all drivers must be at least 16 years of age and have a valid driver's license. The speed limit on Bald Head Island is 18 mph. Drivers must observe all North Carolina State traffic regulations and laws. Village police officers enforce all regulations and laws on the island and will issue fines for traffic violations.

All passengers must be seated while the cart is in motion. Carts should be driven on paved or graveled surfaces only and should not be parked in traffic lanes. Driving on the golf course, beaches or dunes is not allowed. Cart drivers are asked to move to the right of the road to allow trams and service vehicles to pass on the left.



COMMUNITY OF BALD HEAD ISLAND

POLICE, FIRE, MEDICAL EMERGENCY, 911

The Bald Head Island Police Department offers community policing services, as well as medical responder certification of all officers.

All Bald Head Island phones are part of the Brunswick County 911 Emergency System. If you have a police, fire or medical emergency, please dial 911. It is important that you know the address and telephone number of the residence you are occupying. When placing a 911 call, please give your street address, and then watch for and signal approaching emergency vehicles.

A basic medical treatment room is at the main fire station, and all paid firefighters are paramedic-level certified. Advanced Life Support and Basic Life Support ambulance units are available for transportation to the island ferry terminal for ferry transportation to Southport, as well as emergency transportation from the mainland ferry landing at Indigo Plantation in Southport to nearby Dosher Memorial Hospital. Brunswick Hospital on US 17 South is just 20 miles away, and New Hanover Regional Medical Center in Wilmington is 30 miles away. The Southport Rescue Squad is willing to provide mutual aid for emergency medical treatment and transportation to area hospitals.

Emergency phones are located at the creek access and boat launch site off North Bald Head Wynd, the Ibis Roost Clubhouse, Royal James Landing poolside area, Timbercreek poolside area, the Village Fire Station, the Post Office and at public beach accesses 9, 13, 23, 24a, 26, 30, 35 and 42.

For non-emergency issues, please contact the Bald Head Island Police Department at 910-457-5252 or the Bald Head Island Fire/EMS Department at 910-457-4310.

ADVERSE WEATHER

If hurricanes or other extreme weather conditions occur, the Village of Bald Head Island may issue a voluntary or mandatory evacuation notice. Please turn to the Bald Head Island community TV channel, 3, or www.villagebhi.org for current updates.

POST OFFICE

The Village of Bald Head Island post office is located on Lighthouse Wynd, across from Old Baldy Lighthouse and next door to the Village Hall. Window service is available from 1-3 p.m., Monday-Friday. Mail may be dropped at the post office, and box holders may pick up mail 24 hours a day, seven days a week. Call 910-457-6304.

TRASH PICKUP

From Memorial Day through Labor Day, trash pickup occurs twice a week. From Labor Day through Memorial Day, trash pickup occurs once a week. All homes have a wooden "Yes/No" plaque that can be seen from the road. When guests have trash to be picked up, they should turn the sign to the red "Yes." When they don't have any trash, the sign should be turned to "No." All garbage must be bagged and placed in animal-proof trash containers to prevent wildlife from feeding on waste materials. For questions relating to trash pickup, call the Public Works department at 910-457-5422.

RECYCLING

Property owners and guests who wish to recycle aluminum, glass, plastic, newspaper, mixed paper and junk mail may separate these materials and take them to the Solid Waste and Recycling Center located on Edward Teach Wynd, just past the

Fire Station. Please be aware that cardboard is no longer accepted at this site.

GRILLING

A Village ordinance prohibits barbecue grilling on wooden decks, patios or under houses, as this constitutes a fire hazard. Propane gas grills are permitted. Barbecue grills may be used on the ground level at least 10 feet from dwellings. No grilling is permitted at Lighthouse Landing, Sabal Palm or Royal James. Both Sabal Palm and Royal James offer community grills. No charcoal grills are permitted at Flora's Bluff or Killegray Ridge.

LIBRARY

A small honor-system lending library, located harbourside adjacent to Eb & Flo's Steam Bar, is open year-round for all island guests and residents. Children's books, games and puzzles are available at Guest Services.

OLD BALDY FOUNDATION

The foundation is a nonprofit organization formed in 1985 to preserve and restore "Old Baldy," North Carolina's oldest lighthouse, built in 1817. Funded through private donations, as well as state and federal grants, the organization provides educational information about the historic structure, its keepers and its role in the island's seafaring history. 910-457-7481.





SMITH ISLAND MUSEUM OF HISTORY

Completed in the spring of 2000, this structure is a replica of the 1885 lighthouse keeper's cottage that stood to the west of Old Baldy Lighthouse. The museum is furnished with household items from that time period and displays many historic artifacts. It also houses a gift shop, with proceeds benefiting the Old Baldy Foundation. Administrative offices for the foundation are located on the upper level of the museum. Tours of the museum and lighthouse are available for a per-person fee. BALD HEAD ISLAND CONSERVANCY AND SMITH ISLAND LAND TRUST

The Bald Head Island Conservancy is a nonprofit organization founded in 1983, whose mission is to protect, preserve and promote the natural environment of the Smith Island complex. This unique area includes Bald Head, Middle and Bluff islands, all of which are bound by the Cape Fear River and the Atlantic Ocean in southeastern North Carolina. In its role as the islands' environmental advocate, the Bald Head Island Conservancy sponsors and facilitates scientific research of benefit to this barrier island environment, and it provides diverse activities to enrich, educate and enlighten the islands' many visitors and residents. As a subsidiary corporation and partner of the Conservancy, the Smith Island Land Trust (SILT) complements these efforts by preserving significant properties in perpetuity, ensuring that land within the island complex will be forever protected in its natural state. As a 501(C)(3) nonprofit membership organization, the Conservancy and SILT are able to continue their work through the generosity and commitment of its many members, property owners, island visitors and other supporters. SMITH ISLAND ART LEAGUE

In 1993, property owners created the Smith Island Art League to foster the island's artistic community. The league holds an annual public art show on Memorial Day Weekend for the sale of members' works. Each fall the group also hosts a distinguished guest lecture by a recognized artist, professor or curator.

VILLAGE CHAPEL OF BALD HEAD ISLAND

Nondenominational services are held year-round, each Sunday at 8:30 a.m., and from Memorial Day through Labor Day, an additional service is held at 10 a.m. in this community-funded creekside chapel near Old Baldy Lighthouse. An endowment fund has been established for memorial donations, and arrangements may be made for special services. 910-457-1183.

OTHER SERVICES

GOLF CART SALES, RENTAL AND REPAIR

Bald Head Island Limited's Vehicle Sales & Maintenance facility, located on Edward Teach Wynd in Service Village, is an authorized E-Z-Go dealer. Golf carts may be leased on long-term (four-year) leases, or rented on a daily, weekly or monthly basis. BARGE

Bald Head Island Limited's barge is available for carrying cargo, vehicles, supplies and equipment to the island. CONTRACTOR SERVICES

A contractor ferry leaves from Deep Point Marina off Moore Street on Ferry Road in Southport, where contractor mainland parking is available. For directions or reservations call 910-457-5205.

A contractor parking lot located on the island at the end of Edward Teach Wynd near Federal Road offers contractors a convenient, central location to gather. Overnight parking of vehicles, reserved parking spaces and fuel are available for contractors. Locked storage, modular shelter, restrooms and snack vending machines are also provided. FACILITY MAINTENANCE

A fully equipped and staffed maintenance department provides repair and maintenance management for island homes on Bald Head Island Limited's Property Management program. Annual service contracts are also available for homes not

All utilities are installed underground and require initial hookup and monthly service charges. The Village of Bald Head Island Utility Department offers water and sewer service; Progress Energy, electric; BellSouth, telephone and DSL Internet; and Tele-Media Corporation, cable television service.

NATURAL PRESERVES

BEACHES

Our beaches are one of our most prized resources. Here you can walk, play in the surf and shell for hours. The dunes, however, are fragile and their preservation is of prime consideration on the island. Traversing dunes damages vegetation and increases erosion. Walking on the dunes is prohibited by the Village of Bald Head Island ordinance and violators may incur a fine. Designated public beach accesses are conveniently placed.

Fourteen miles of pristine beaches rim the island's west, south and east shores. Since no lifeguards patrol the beaches, swimmers are advised not to swim alone, out too far, or at night. Emergency phones are located at nine beach accesses, and life rings are located at most beach accesses.

SALT MARSH AND CREEKS

More than 10,000 acres of salt marsh and tidal creeks are deeded to the State of North Carolina in perpetuity to remain undeveloped. The creeks and marshes are home to clams, crabs, oysters and a wide variety of fish, as well as numerous water birds. Dolphins and alligators occasionally venture into the creeks.

MARITIME FOREST

The forest is filled with a variety of trees, including live oaks, dogwoods, sabal palms, cedars, yaupons, wax myrtles and junipers, which form a thick canopy over Federal Road and many lanes and wynds through the forest. Nearly 200 of the islands' 1,000 total acres of maritime forest are deeded to the State of North Carolina to remain undeveloped.





BALD HEAD WOODS NATURE TRAIL

Under the guardianship of the Bald Head Island Conservancy, this nature trail off Federal Road in the Maritime Forest Preserve leads to and around a centuries-old live oak tree with a girth of 216 inches. When last measured its average crown spread 84 feet.

M. KENT MITCHELL NATURE TRAIL

Visitors may enjoy this lovely 20-minute walking trail at the edge of the maritime forest, along the salt marsh and over a tidal creek to a marsh inlet, with many labeled plant species along the way. A marker at the beginning of the trail is located on Federal Road, just east of the intersection with Muscadine Wynd.

CONSERVANCY WILDLIFE OVERLOOK

Located off Stede Bonnet Wynd, this scenic overlook provides a serene view of one of the island's many freshwater lagoons and its woodland setting. The site offers off-road parking, a wooden walkway and a spacious deck with railings and benches for viewing the flora and fauna.

VILLAGE OF BALD HEAD ISLAND

An incorporated municipality, the Village of Bald Head Island is governed by an elected council and mayor, and operates on a budget funded in part by ad valorem property taxes. A Village manager and support staff administer the daily business of the Village. Offices are located in the Town Hall across from Old Baldy Lighthouse. The Village also employs a fire chief, building inspector, paramedic/firefighters, police chief and officers. Tax revenues provide services such as fire protection, police, emergency medical, garbage collection, building inspection and road, median, and beach access construction and maintenance.

PROPERTY OWNERS ASSOCIATIONS

Most Bald Head Island property owners become

members of a property owner's association. Dues are payable each year as determined by the respective boards of directors of the associations. The associations, through their many committees, are active in civic affairs. The largest of these, the Bald Head Association, has its own administrative offices and activity center located beside the Village Chapel on Lighthouse Wynd.

LANDMARKS AND HISTORICAL SITES

OLD BALDY LIGHTHOUSE

Known as "Old Baldy," North Carolina's oldest lighthouse was built in 1817 and is the island's most prominent landmark. For a \$3 minimum donation to the Old Baldy Foundation, visitors and residents may climb the 108 steps to the top for a panoramic view of the island.

BALD HEAD DUNE

The island's namesake high dune or headland was



used by river pilots to sight approaching ships and by ship captains as a landmark. Located on the southwest point of the island at the mouth of the Cape Fear River, this dune was visible from far out at sea and resembled a bald head.

U.S. LIFE SAVING STATION

Quarters for servicemen of the U.S. Life Saving Service were established on East Beach in 1882 and relocated to South Beach in 1914. Life saving boats were housed in an outbuilding that is the only remaining structure, now a private home located on Sea Lavender Court.

OLD BOATHOUSE

Situated on Bald Head Creek, this structure was once used to shelter wooden vessels that brought food and supplies for people manning the Cape Fear Lighthouse and the U.S. Life Saving Station.

FORT HOLMES SITE

This dirt and log reinforced earthworks fortification was built in 1863 during the Civil War by Confederate troops to protect the entrance to the Cape Fear River. A model of the fort is displayed in the Smith Island Museum of History.

CAPTAIN CHARLIE'S STATION

Built in 1903, these three clapboard cottages overlooking Frying Pan Shoals were named for Captain Charles Swan, and housed the lighthouse keepers and their families. They are now listed in the National Register of Historic Places and are privately owned.

CAPE FEAR LIGHTHOUSE FOUNDATION

The concrete base of the lighthouse that Captain Swan manned is still firmly anchored in the dunes near the original brick oil house where lantern fuel was stored, and which is now a part of the BHI Conservancy campus. Built in 1903, the lighthouse was decommissioned in 1958 and subsequently destroyed when the more modern Oak Island Light was built and placed in service.

CAPE FEAR AND FRYING PAN SHOALS

The southeastern tip of Bald Head Island takes its name from the shoals stretching 20 miles out into the Atlantic Ocean. Cape Fear is one of three North Carolina capes, which also include Cape Hatteras and Cape Lookout.

EXCURSIONS TO SOUTHPORT

OLD SMITHVILLE BURYING GROUNDS

Centuries-old tombstones beneath a canopy of ancient live oaks and dogwoods bear the names of many river pilots, as well as several historic local and state figures. Located at the corner of Rhett and Nash Streets.

MARITIME MUSEUM

Funded in part by the State of North Carolina, this nonprofit museum features a collection of local and regional artifacts depicting the nautical history of Southport. A modest fee is charged. 116 North Howe Street. 910-457-0003.

HISTORIC DISTRICT WALKING TOUR

A self-guided tour takes walkers along the Waterfront Park and Bay Street past many stately old homes dating from the late 18th and early 19th centuries. Visitors may also browse through antique and gift shops in the business district. 910-457-7927.

FRANKLIN SQUARE PARK AND ART GALLERY

Picnic in a grove of ancient live oaks and view the works of local and regional artists in the nearby art gallery. 130 East West Street. 910-457-5450.

ORTON PLANTATION GARDENS

Owners of this antebellum plantation offer a walking tour of its beautiful gardens and chapel overlooking riverfront marshes. Located on Hwy. 133, 12 miles north of Southport, it has been the

setting for several movies. The gardens are open March through November. 910-371-6851.

OLD BRUNSWICK TOWN

This is the archeological site of North Carolina's first seaport town, which flourished from 1726 to 1776. 910-371-6613.

SOUTHPORT-FORT FISHER FERRY

For vehicles and passengers, this state-operated ferry departs its landing site just northeast of Southport for a scenic crossing of the Cape Fear River. Visit Fort Fisher Historic Site dating from the Civil War, and its museum. \$5 for vehicles up to 20 feet, \$10 for vehicles 21 feet and over. 910-457-6942.

N.C. AQUARIUM AT FORT FISHER

Within one mile of the Fort Fisher museum, the newly expanded state aquarium is one of three along the N.C. coast. Now three times its original size, the aquarium offers outstanding exhibits featuring a full spectrum of aquatic life from the piedmont headwaters of the Cape Fear River to its coastal convergence with the Atlantic Ocean and the shoals extending beyond the cape. 2201 South Fort Fisher Blvd. #1, Kure Beach, N.C. 910-458-8257.

BY PLANE

Three airports service the Southport, N.C., area. Wilmington International Airport is approximately a 30-mile drive north via US 17 and NC 133 from our ferry landing at Indigo Plantation and Marina. The Myrtle Beach Jetport is 60 miles south via US 17 and NC 211. Both airports offer convenient flight schedules on major carriers. Brunswick County Airport, just five miles from Southport, services small private planes with a 4,000-foot hard-surface landing field, NDB-A approach, and landing lights that can be keyed by the pilot.

BY CAR

Interstate 40 and Highway 74/76 link the region directly with Interstate 95. Entering Southport on NC 211 (Howe Street), turn right onto West 9th Street and continue to the ferry landing at Indigo Plantation and Marina. A 20-minute passenger ferry ride will transport you along the Intracoastal Waterway and across the Cape Fear River to the Bald Head Island Marina and the ferry landing.

BY BOAT

The island is also easily accessible by private yacht from the Intracoastal Waterway, Cape Fear River and Atlantic Ocean. Located at the mouth of the river, the full-service marina accommodates yachts up to 100 feet. Slips are available for just a few hours, overnight or extended periods of time.
